For most of October we are in Marcheshvan, our Jewish month without holidays. Some rabbis consider this month to be mar, bitter, from that lack of scheduled celebration, as if we overspent our holiday allowance and now must get by on none. Others point out that *mar* also means “drop,” a drop of water. Noah’s flood began in the month of Marcheshvan with the first drops of the yoreh, the rain.

Flood or drought. Does either word fit you right now, in the wake of the tidal wave of High Holy Days (Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Sh’mini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah) that Tishrei carried? In the wake of a summer’s worth of ramp-up and best-laid-planning for a fall of back-to-work, back-to-school, back-to-“normal” that is finally here and ... perhaps not what you expected? There are years when that holy anticipatory energy bears me up past the holidays, sending me headlong into the weeks afterward. There are years when I feel hollow and spent afterward, like a conch shell on the beach as the tide recedes.

Judaism has words for these states of being. One theological word for fullness that I love is *shefa*, the overflow of Divine love that I imagine caused the Psalmist to say “Kosi r’vaya,” my cup runs over (Psalm 23). *Shefa* is a feeling of a world so deeply saturated with love that it’s spilling, dripping, you catch it out of the corner of your eye every time you look up. *Shefa* is what our liturgical love songs, *Ahavat Olam* and *Ahavah Rabbah* (Cosmic Love and Great Love), praise and direct, evening and morning. *Shefa* is for sharing; you couldn’t stop it flowing to others if you tried. The wells of your spirit are refilled, and they are springing up.

When some action, some activity, some relationship has left our lives, there are times when we want to refill that space, and times when we want to leave it empty. Hollow. Letting the wind make music in us.

Our Jewish relationship with emptiness is more complex. The word *hollow* translates as “chillul,” which can also mean desecration (yanking the holiness out of something). Yet *chillul*’s same Hebrew root of *chet-yod-lamed* is present in a *challil* (flute) used to make music of praise. Mary Renault’s Merlin calls himself, as he recovers from a vision sent to him by his gods, “a reed with the pith pulled out ... a whistle for the winds” (Mary Renault, *The Crystal Cave*). And the root also gives us words for dance (*machol*) and laboring to birth (*y’cholleil*).

We may be emptied out in the aftermath of channeling, or creating, life-force and holiness. But that opened space that remembers the shape of what filled it leaves room and resonance for deeper breath. When some action, some activity, some relationship has left our lives, there are times when we want to

refill that space, and times when we want to leave it empty. Hollow. Letting the wind make music in us.

Whether we come to this month drained or overflowing, we can take our own measure, privately and without public obligation, in the days of Marcheshvan. And we can take thought for what potentials we want to let into that holy, echoing space between high points. If our wells are empty—with what do we want to refill them? If they're overflowing—where do we want to direct that flow?

Only you can tell.



RABBINIC INTERN ELLI'S REFLECTIONS



September has been a long month, at least for me. A month of digging, soul-searching, and personal work, as dictated by the High Holidays. A month of so many different Jewish holidays it can be easy to be overwhelmed. We just finished Simchat Torah and rolled our Torah in its endless cycle from the end to the beginning.

And that is where we start reading the Torah again. We start with Genesis or B'reishit. *B'reishit* is often translated as "in the beginning", but as someone who has come to love Hebrew grammar, I found out that's just slightly off. Instead, *b'reishit* means "at the beginning of."

The phrase is never properly finished. Translated this way, the first sentence of Torah reads, "At the beginning of _____, God created the heavens and the earth." And so, I came to one of my first questions in studying Torah and Judaism. At the beginning of what? There are so many ways that phrase might end. Just a few I thought of: At the beginning of the world. At the beginning of time. At the beginning of creation.

There's something fitting about this, the way the first word of Torah is an incomplete phrase. We are never done with Torah; instead, we wrap back around to the beginning. But the beginning of what? What are you beginning this year? What would you like to end?

This is harder than ever to consider, as we sit in the interminable and messy middle of a pandemic we thought we were seeing the end of. We thought this year might be a new beginning of post-pandemic life. Instead, we're still "too far in to turn around and not close enough to see the light," as Brené Brown describes the middle of processes in her book *Rising Strong*.

And yet, we are still here, in this new year, at this new point. This year, as I face many new beginnings, the beginning of my time at Temple Emanu-El, the beginning of living with my significant other, and the beginning of my first year without my mother, I know I have much to be grateful for and to mourn. Life is weird and strange, so of course we're in the beginning and in the middle, all at once. And so my questions to you are these:

What are you at the beginning of? What light might guide you right now? What might have ended that brought you to the beginning again? What middle might you want to get unstuck from?

We get to complete the phrase ourselves. At the beginning of this year, let's give ourselves a chance to do so.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Spotlight on Sandy Venner and Lynn Dreyfuss Martin, Adult Education Committee Co-Chairs



Sandra Venner and Lynn Martin co-chair the Adult Education Committee. Sandy joined Temple Emanu-El in 1988 and Lynn joined in 1998.

Sandy grew up on a family farm in rural Iowa, practicing crop rotation and raising both livestock and their feed. She met Bob Bender, fresh out of law school, as she prepared in Wisconsin for graduate school in social work. Sandy discovered that social policy was her professional passion—since “it combined my interest in history with sociology”—and spent her career developing social policy

through research and community organizing. For the last twenty years of her career, she worked for the Institute on Assets and Social Policy, first located at Tufts University and then at Brandeis, focusing on racial wealth inequality and developing policies to help lower-income people build wealth, including generational wealth, that provides “security in times of economic downfall.” Sandy is also a civil servant in her town of Merrimac, Massachusetts; having served on the Board of Selectmen for six years, she currently chairs the Planning Board and Affordable Housing Board of Trustees and serves on the Open Space Committee and Rent Control Board. For fun, she bikes, skis, and loves to travel and walk and hike in the woods with Bob. They look forward to re-planning a cherished trip to the Southern National Parks.

Sandy loves the connective power of our Temple Emanu-El community. She and Bob moved to Merrimac in 1987 and soon realized that the rabbi at Temple Emanu-El was Rabbi Korinow—with whom Bob had attended Hebrew School, as the bar mitzvah student of Rabbi Korinow’s father (z”l)! Sandy still enjoys the enduring sense of comfort and familiarity with other Temple members that grew for her on the first Israel trip that Rabbi Korinow led. She looks forward especially to High Holy Days next year with many more of us back in the building and the “treat” of seeing people after many months.



Lynn Dreyfuss Martin, past president of Temple Emanu-El, grew up in Cliffside Park, New Jersey, on a street on the palisades looking across the Hudson to Manhattan, in a heavily Italian neighborhood where everyone knew what a bagel was. Her parents were pillars of their local synagogue; Lynn’s grandmother, who took her often into the City for shopping at Saks and fashion

critique, was deeply involved with Hadassah. Lynn’s parents made sure that Lynn and her brother celebrated becoming b’nei mitzvah and that they made it to the USY dances! She earned an undergraduate degree in nineteenth-century European history, with a minor in art. Lynn enjoyed her career in marketing and sales, which started out right in Haverhill with a ski company. Now she brings her talents to bear on several Temple Emanu-El roles (Religious School administrative assistant and member of the board of directors, in addition to Adult Ed co-chair!). Lynn also creates beautiful paper collages, enjoying the stream-of-consciousness and playfulness of that medium. She loves spending time near the ocean—“it’s very calming, very beautiful ... every season brings a different landscape, different colors, different views.”

Lynn moved to Newburyport in 1979 and, homesick for Jewish ritual and a community where she didn’t “have to explain everything [Jewish],” she made her way to Temple Emanu-El, where “the synagogue felt like home, and I thought, ‘Yeah. This is it.’” The Temple Sisterhood made her welcome, and Lynn thinks with particular pride of the b’nei mitzvah celebrations of her children—Zachary, who worked hard and successfully with Beth Levin to prepare, and Julia, who “just soared!” (Mazal tov, Lynn and Zachary and family, on Zachary’s marriage last month!) Lynn preaches the power of what “just one hour” of volunteering (a monthly meeting, a little research) can do, for an individual and for our temple, and she practices what she preaches.

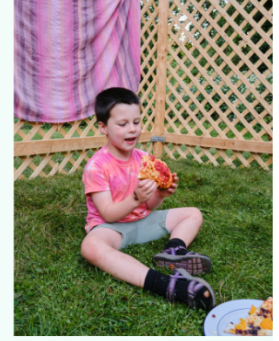
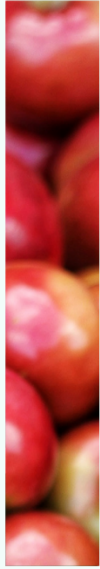
