Shabbat Morning Service



Shalom chevre,

We're in the heat of the summer. Rain is scarce; we gravitate to flowing water. It's a time of need for our bodies, which, like our gardens, crave hydration and refreshment. And for our souls too—whether or not we work on school-year time, COVID has created a seasonal reliance on mild weather and fresh air. Summer lets us breathe more deeply in and out. Summer time often has fewer scheduled commitments. Suddenly we may realize

that our reserves are depleted.

Last month my clergy colleagues and I discussed this kind of spiritual reservoir, how we tend it. All of us used the language of water, living water—mayyim hayyim—the same terms our Jewish community uses for Torah. We recognized the dangers of overdrawing the water in our wells. We talked about letting our wells refill. To what does one say no? What does one add that's life-giving and fills our souls?

It's important to tend our wells. There is a discussion in the Talmud, <u>tractate Ta'anit</u> (on fasts in times of drought, to bring the rains). Rabbi Nachman quotes Rabbi Yochanan to Rabbi Yitzchak, asserting that idol worship, avodah zarah, is twice as bad as any other sin. Rabbi Yochanan brings as proof-text a verse from Jeremiah, <u>2:13</u>, in which idol worship is allegorized as reckless abandonment of a reliable water source: "For my people have committed two evils; they have forsaken Me, the fountain of living waters, to hew for themselves cisterns, broken cisterns which cannot even hold water." God is the m'kor mayyim chayyim, the flowing source of the water of life. Human attempts to strike out solo and store or hoard that spiritual water, rather than remaining in precious proximity to the wellspring (God), are doomed to fail.

Drink deeply from those life-giving waters, and plant yourself by them, and may no pressure or untrue goal uproot you and lure you away.

Jeremiah calls this human error "two evils." Idol worship, says the prophet, harms God. Letting our wells run dry harms ourselves. They're connected: we generally let our wells run dry when we worship or let ourselves be ruled by things that don't satisfy our spiritual and emotional needs. Anxiety, work, power, productivity, anger, luxury; these can all be idols. When we forget to drink from what fills our souls, and instead wear ourselves out trying to construct an artificial container for our needs, we dry out. When we abandon time with our families and friends and communities of choice, time pursuing the personal skills and hobbies that make us happy, time moving our bodies in healthy and enjoyable ways, time outside in the great outdoors that reminds us that there's so much more to this world than what we can control.

we end up thirsty. We stress the fragile containers in which we're isolating the water of life. We give out more of ourselves than we can replenish.

Contrast that with the "happy person" of Psalm 1, of whom it's said, "v'hayah k'eitz shatul al-palgei-mayim." Such a person is like a tree planted next to streams of water, which gives fruit in its season; its leaves don't fade, and all that it makes, thrives. I think about the practices and habits that nourish my own soul, and I recognize that in the times that I give myself more access to them—even when it's just a taste—everything in my life goes better. You have also, I hope, had that experience. When have you been happiest? What habits, what moments, nourish you and keep your soul green and growing? What helps bring you closer to that spring?

Come back to your water sources this month. The past two years have been a long dry spell, full of many stressors keeping us apart from interactions and activities that are our fountains of spiritual fulfillment. We have, God willing, an opportunity to lift our eyes from the frantic struggle to just make it through a pandemic, and to look for what helps us to thrive. See people you love, if you can. Take time for yourself. Say no to whatever you can that does not bring you joy, and try adding in something that does. Drink deeply from those life-giving waters, and plant yourself by them, and may no pressure or untrue goal uproot you and lure you away.

Spotlight on Jennifer Lampron, Incoming President

Jennifer Lampron is our temple's new president. She's been a member for forty-three years and has previously served Temple Emanu-El in many roles: vice president; chair of the membership committee; member of the adult education, dues, religious school, and social action committees; and teacher in our religious school. Jenn does prototype and integration engineering at E Ink. She and her husband, Derik, and their two daughters, Jocelyne and Jacqueline, live in Newton, New

Hampshire. Jocelyne recently graduated high school—mazal tov!— and will start college in the fall, pursuing a career in nursing. Jacqueline will celebrate becoming bat mitzvah here in our temple on July 16!

Jenn was born in Baltimore, Maryland, and spent her first few years in a traditionally observant Jewish neighborhood; both sets of her grandparents were Orthodox. She moved up here with her parents, Jules and Judy Rutstein, and her brother, Josh, when Jules took a job in the area, and they immediately joined Temple Emanu-El. Jenn remembers coming to Friday night services every single week till she

was thirteen, remembers the long onegs afterward, putting a slice of lemon in her cup of tea (she was only allowed to drink tea at temple), and then eating endless lemon slices as her parents chatted with other members. Older members of the community "treated [her] like a princess" as a little girl, which she loved. Jenn's formative years were "made in Haverhill," and she graduated from Haverhill High School. She earned her bachelor's in engineering and her MBA from UMass Lowell. Jenn describes herself as "a tinkerer! I like seeing what went wrong and how I can fix it." At her first job after college, with Parlex (a manufacturer of flexible circuitry and laminated cable assemblies) in Methuen, Jenn met Derik at a holiday party. Jenn delights in watching her kids do things that make them happy, like field hockey and gymnastics. She says that "seeing smiles on their faces brings me joy." Jenn also enjoys doing anything

outdoors: hiking, biking, and running with her "BRFs," a close group of six running friends with whom she trains and runs in competitive events. This year they ran the Eastern States twenty-mile run and the Providence Marathon.

Jenn feels and appreciates reverence in holy space and our prayer services. She has strong memories of those who shaped her formative experiences in our community but are

> no longer with us-Rabbi Jacobson z"I singing "All the World Shall Come to Serve Thee" on the High Holy Days, Stuart Mandell z"l and Janet Kopel z"I chanting. "Those voices ring through my ears." Jenn finds religious Jewish meaning in Jewish "group effort": call-and-response volleys of the Torah service liturgy and favorite, memorable tunes, the communal language and nature of Jewish prayer, social action, and education. "Religion community. We're not coming before God as an individual saying 'judge me fairly.' We accept the ownership of whatever happens, together."

Jenn brings her considerable

energies, talents, and temple experience to bear on her new presidency. Her biggest goals are to reduce our budget deficit (a goal of her predecessors as well), and to bring members together for more group activities and projects beyond the sanctuary services. Jenn says, "If you have an idea for something you'd like to see here, we welcome your initiatives. Everything we do here, every committee, exists because someone said 'I'd like to see this happen!'" We're excited for your leadership, Jenn, and to be your partners in creating ever more opportunities for our community to join hearts and forces in doing Jewish good in the world.



Honor Your Father and Your Mother

It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.
