Dear Chevre,

What a month it has been. Back at the beginning of October, we came together in our sukkot, those fragile temporary dwellings in our "Season of Joy" which remind us of our ancestors' journey through the wilderness. Days later, we learned that Hamas terrorists had attacked our

extended community in Israel, and the sacred obligation to be joyful felt all-but impossible. As a community, we responded by coming together to support each other and to show our solidarity with Israel. Our weekly Shabbat morning services have taken on new meaning as we've created opportunities to seek guidance from our tradition, to process our thoughts and feelings, and to grieve the terrible, painful losses from this war.

I have wanted so desperately for the past month to find the right words that will offer comfort and ease our spirits. As I worried about not having the right words to share with you, I remembered another time I felt at a similar loss. As a student chaplain at Brigham and Women's Hospital, I often worried that I would say the wrong thing or not know what to say. I turned to my colleagues and friends for advice. Each person had their own "magic formula" for what to say when I first entered a patient's room, but I knew none of the suggestions would work every time I met with patients and their families.

As I continued my pastoral training, I learned that there was one thing that did work every time, and it was both easier and harder than I could have imagined.

The one thing that consistently brought comfort to the people I encountered was the gift of presence.

It's true that sitting next to someone is not a physically demanding task. However, sitting next to someone who is in pain, whether physical or otherwise, and trusting that my presence is enough was enormously difficult. Even when I could not find words or when I knew that no words could help, I found that simply sitting with someone when they were in pain, physical or otherwise, could be enough.

My presence did not cure anyone of their illnesses or make anyone's sadness and anger disappear. However, being with people, even if I did not say anything beyond introducing myself, did seem to help them when they struggled. Often people would thank me "just for being there" or "for not letting them go through this alone."

The truth of the importance of presence is deeply embedded in our tradition. We learn, time and time again, that we are not meant to be alone and we are, in fact, not alone. At the beginning of Torah, God says "it is not good for the human being to be alone."* Throughout our spiritual history, God tells our ancestors that God will be with them. God promises to be with each of the patriarchs in Genesis. When Moses, in the story of the Exodus, expresses doubt about going to Pharaoh, God tells him that God will be with him. As the Israelites make their way through the wilderness, God travels ahead of them as a pillar of cloud by day and a pillar of fire at night. God's presence is not only promised in the Torah but throughout our sacred text tradition. The Psalmist writes numerous times not to be afraid for God will be with us.

It's ironic that, when we are in distress and in most need of support, it can feel most difficult for us to perceive God's presence. We might doubt that those holy teachings apply to our experience, and we might feel as though we are alone. In those dark moments, I remember the time I spent with patients and their families in the hospital. When we sat together, embraced, and they shared about their experiences, something amazing happened. People who had been looking at the ground now saw each other and did not look away. People who had been crying individually now took turns or found themselves laughing at memories of happier times. Even though people still felt worried, scared, sad, or whatever else they felt, they also felt held, supported, and not alone.

The events in Israel this past month have been heartbreaking. I do not think I have the "right words" for this moment in history. What I would like to offer, in lieu of words, is the gift of presence. Even though the High Holidays and Sukkot are behind us, there are still many opportunities to be present with each other at Temple Emanu-El this month.

As promised, I will begin facilitating a class based on Rabbi Toba Spitzer's book, *God is Here: Re-imagining the Divine*. We will meet on the following Sunday afternoons from 3:00-4:30 pm in Starensier: November 5, 19 and December 3, 10, 17. If there is interest, we might continue the discussion in the new year. You can read a description of the book and purchase a copy here: <https://bookshop.org/a/15414/9781250764492>. It also is available as an audiobook at the Haverhill Public Library and in print form through the Minuteman Library Network. Each meeting will stand on its own, so you are welcome to come to any of the sessions regardless of whether you came to a previous one. I am excited to start this learning with you!

At the beginning of November, we will have two special gatherings. November 9 marks the 85th anniversary of Kristallnacht, the Night of Broken Glass. On Sunday November 12 at 3:00 pm, we will commemorate this tragedy and honor the memories of those we lost with a ritual based on the structure of a seder. As with our Passover seders, this Kristallnacht seder will have opportunities for all of us to participate. I hope we will be inspired from our people's resilience through this act of remembering, and I look forward to journeying

from darkness to light with you. On Friday November 10 at 7:00 pm, we will celebrate Peace Shabbat at which we will honor our military veterans for their service to our country.

For now, as the news from Israel continues to unfold, let us continue to pray for her safety and for peace in the region. Let's add to the power of our prayers the gift of each other's presence. I look forward to the blessing of coming together with you at Temple Emanu-El.

Honor Your Father and Your Mother

It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.

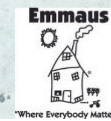

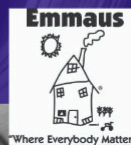
