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Shalom, chevre. As our new month begins, so does Pesach! I hope I'll see you at our Pesach community seder on April 2 and at our services on April 6 and 13 (with Shabbat Chol HaMo'eid Pesach on April 8). We are in the thick of the Exodus story, hip-deep in struggle and liberation. As I write, it's still March—Women's History Month—and it feels fitting to focus our attention this Pesach on the liberation struggles of women, girls, and other people assigned female at birth.

Miriam the Prophet has been my archetype of women's liberation for most of my life. A rare woman prophet among so many men, including her two formidable brothers; a voice of defiance against God's favoritism toward Moshe; a singer and a drummer and a leader. Young Miriam successfully convinced her parents, in the face of Pharaoh's genocidal orders, to try for another child, certain that he would become a prophetic savior of the Israelite people. Yet in the moment when Moses is about to be placed in the Nile River, and his parents can no longer keep him safe, midrashic tradition says that Miriam's father raises either his voice or his hand to her and jeers, "Miriam, where is your prophecy?"

This month, this Women's History Month, I reflect on newly emboldened domestic and international gender-based discrimination, visions denied and freedoms rolled back. Person after person is being told that their dreams are dust. I hear Miriam's father everywhere.

Each act of liberation makes all of us more free, and together we can travel that narrow passageway to the dance of rejoicing that waits for us on the other side.

I hear him in the heart-shattering silence of Afghan public schools where, until the Taliban's abrupt return to power in fall 2021, three million girls were educated, and whose doors are now closed. In Shabana Basij-Rasikh's words, "All of it is gone. Live in silence now behind the walls of your home, the Taliban say to women and girls. Live a ghost life."

I hear Miriam's father in the antiabortion rulings of Supreme Court justices and legislation in dozens of states in the USA, which re-criminalize the civil right to bodily autonomy to which people with uteruses have enjoyed access for decades. Rabbi Tali Adler writes that "women's wombs lie at the heart of the Exodus." When a person cannot exercise control over their own reproductive medical choices, they are not free. When they want an abortion and are instead forced to bear children, they are not free.

I hear Miriam's father in the homophobic and transphobic laws also being proposed and passed in so many of our country's states. People certain of

who they are and how they can most fully live that identity are being blocked from accessing the modern medical care and social and educational activities that can help them turn their prophetic dreams into reality. They are trapped in bodies or gender expressions that are not theirs. Their families and medical providers risk jail if they help. Trans people are fleeing these states as they can. Not everyone can.

"Miriam, where is your prophecy?"

Here's the good news: Miriam does not let her father's disbelief prescribe her life's path. She continues her prophetic work, and in the Pesach story we ultimately see her on the shores of the Reed Sea, praising and leading the Israelite women in praise with her. In our time, too, her fight for the freedom to channel and share visions of liberated identity continues. Dove Morissette of UUCH writes delightedly of educational strides for the women and girls of the Afghan families in Haverhill that the church is supporting. And "in Kabul and across Afghanistan, the secret schools are opening again, with girls coming to learn from women who may never have been teachers before, but who now quite literally risk their lives to beat the darkness back. 'To bring a sense of humanity,' one of these teachers said to me, 'we share our knowledge." 5 In our country, too, popular protests and legislative and judicial challenges speak out against the laws that limit reproductive rights and full and free gender expression. A Welcome Home network is growing to help trans refugees and families move from states that oppress them to states where they are free; please talk to me if you'd like to get involved.

When we pour Miriam's cup of water at our community seder on Sunday night, I hope all of us will lift up these struggles for freedom. When we sing of Miriam and the well of her water and wisdom that followed her in the wilderness, I hope we'll pledge ourselves to encourage, support, and learn from visions of freedom for each person born with a womb. Each act of liberation makes all of us more free, and together we can travel that narrow passageway to the dance of rejoicing that waits for us on the other side. Led by Miriam, and her timbrel.

Wishing you a chag kasheir v'sameiach, a kosher and happy Pesach holiday, and a month of more freedom,




PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

At this time of year, it is customary to reach out to our congregants and community with phone calls for our annual Passover fundraising appeal. As we ask for your contributions, I think it is critical to talk about the financial condition of Temple Emanu-El.


Revenue and expense breakdown for the first half of fiscal year 2023 (July-December 2022):





Revenue and expense projections for fiscal year 2024, based on our tentative in-process budget:





The "Endowment/Shortfall" portion of revenue reflects interest and principal from the temple's endowment that is being used to fund operations. Use of the endowment has been an ongoing concern (more than twenty years that I can account for) but has been exacerbated by less revenue from the wealthier in our community, decreases in membership, increases in membership reduction requests, and fewer donations to the Yahrzeit and Jewish Continuity Funds. (Note that since revenue in the second half of the fiscal year (January–June) is lower than in the first half of the year (July–December), the corresponding second-half endowment/budget shortfall is higher.)

To continue serving our members—through the religious education of our children, adult education, and year-round Shabbat and holiday services—we need your financial assistance. The presence of Temple Emanu-El in the greater Merrimack Valley and southern New Hampshire supports our spiritual needs and provides a home for our congregation.



Please join me with a financial donation during our Passover fundraiser to continue our myriad religious, educational, and social activities at Temple Emanu-El. Members of the board of directors will be calling all members over the next several weeks; please take their calls and pledge your support or donate online.



It was fairly remarkable to see the response to this controversial judicial proposition across all walks of Israeli society, from reservists to business tech leaders, cutting across religious and social affiliations. It's my hope in this coming season of freedom that Israel will keep its institutions solidly intact and elect leaders who will prioritize democracy and human rights.

Spotlight on Fredi Hurwitz

Fredi Anne Hurwitz has been a member of Temple Emanu-El since 1979. She enjoyed a forty-year teaching career, is now retired, and lives in Andover with her husband, John. The joy of Fredi's life is to spend time with her family. She talks every week with each of their three sons: Matt, Ben, and Jeffrey.

Fredi loves to create Jewish experiences with her grandchildren, including at Temple Emanu-El family services for the High Holy Days!

Fredi says she always saw her Judaism as "a spiritual seed inside of me that would grow." Fredi grew up in Brooklyn, New York, with her parents, Rita and Harry; her older brothers, David and Bruce; and her younger siblings, Abbe and Martin. Fredi values the close connection and com-mitment to one another that they maintain. All five attended religious school at Marine Park Jewish Center. Fredi was thrilled to be one of the

first girls to celebrate becoming bat mitzvah there. She loved the social world that Marine Park created, as well as the cantor's operatic voice.

Both Rita and Harry worked and saved to ensure that all of their kids could attend both college and grad school. Rita and her two sisters had run away from home to put themselves through higher education in New York City. Harry studied law at night, the first lawyer in his family. David and Bruce, who went to Brooklyn PolyTech, advocated so that Fredi could go to the University of Wisconsin in Madison. She was the first woman in the math department (she later switched to philosophy).

Fredi earned a graduate degree in elementary education, and her first teaching job was in Melrose. She felt that teaching let her offer something to the future. "Six-year-olds are authentic learners. There's not a bone in their bodies that's not honest, and I loved that." Fredi also taught math pedagogy for eight years in Lesley University's graduate studies department.

Fredi has loved and wrestled with Israel throughout her adult Jewish life. She spent the summer of her junior year in college in Israel on Kibbutz HaMapil with members of Marine Park's Young Judea youth group. She rose at 4:00 am to harvest tomatoes. "I loved being in Israel knowing that if I looked right or if I looked left, the people around me were all Jewish." After university, Fredi began to question the picture of Israel and

Palestine which her childhood rabbi had presented. She continues to explore the subject with passion, and is enjoying our community's Spark Your Story discussions as we approach Israel's seventy-fifth anniversary.

After moving to Andover, Fredi and John first attended the Andover Jewish Fellowship, but when their sons were ready for Hebrew school, they started carpooling up to Temple Emanu-El and found us a good fit! All three sons celebrated becoming bar mitzvah and were confirmed. Fredi and John (who grew up Jewish Humanist) felt

strongly about both raising the boys in Judaism and supporting their choices as adults.


Retiring nine years ago was very hard for Fredi. As she has rediscovered her sense of purpose, our temple has helped keep her from staying cocooned in her house! Fredi is an active member in the temple's book club and in Spirited Aging Together. She says that "Judaism has given me a road map for how I behave," and lives by the mitzvot (commandments). She volunteers, and she works part-time in John's office. Though Rita taught fourth grade in an all-Black New York City school, and Fredi's host family on the kibbutz objected to her Moroccan boyfriend, Fredi feels that she is "only now becoming conscious of my own white privilege" and learning the many ways that systemic racism negatively impacts people of color.

Fredi wants to continue her sense of daily gratitude. She hopes that she and John continue to have their health and enjoy one another and their kids and grandkids. We hope so too, Fredi, and we're glad that one of the "hats" you continue to wear so well is participation in our community!






