Dear chevre,

Do you enjoy following a map when you have somewhere to go? Why, or why not? Do maps take you where you expect? Could a map take you to a place that doesn't yet exist?

In *The Cartographers*, Peng Shepherd's new mystery novel, maps plot the intersection between the world around us and the world we dream of. I'm not going to give

away the ending, but the true episode that inspired the author gives scope enough for dreams. In 1930, Otto Lindberg, the owner of a small mapmaking company, General Drafting Corporation, worried that the two biggest mapmakers in the USA (Rand McNally and H.M. Gousha), would be able to copy all of their data and publish as their own the maps that General Drafting's work had created. In order to protect their work, General Drafting published a New York State driving map with a "phantom settlement" marked on it: a small town, Agloe, that did not really exist. Should the larger mapmakers try to republish, Lindberg could point to the made-up town as evidence that they had stolen General Drafting's work. Rand McNally later published their own New York State map and lo and behold, Agloe appeared on it. Lindberg sued. To his and his lawyers' astonishment, when they drove to Agloe to prove its non-existence, they found a small but quite real town, complete with an official record in the county's administration logs. When General Drafting's map had first appeared, people who lived near thenfictional Agloe saw it on the map and assumed that it had been created for them by their local government. They re-recorded business names, addresses, etc. with the new town's name; more residents moved in; and when Rand McNally's cartographers arrived, Agloe had become a living, breathing settlement.

Freedom is never stationary. Never finished, never to be taken for granted. It takes all of our kavannah (intention), all of our ratzon (willpower), and all of our m'od (utmost) to make freedom more than a phantom settlement—to make it tangible.

"If you build it, he will come," says Kevin Costner's character, Ray Kinsella (Field of Dreams, 1989). The story of Agloe takes us further: if you plot and publish it, they will build it. Or, as Zionist Theodor Herzl wrote of the State of Israel, "Im tirtzu, ein zo aggadah." If you will it, it's not [just] legend.¹ I hear Herzl's confident exhortation in President Volodymyr Zelensky's insistence that Ukraine will win the war with Russia and remain whole and independent. He articulates a dream to help his people and their allies realize it. If we can imbue a map that shows our world as we want or need it to be with enough energy, enough conviction, enough belief, if we show that dream to others as if it already exists, we have the power to make it real.


I see our Pesach seder as this kind of a map. Together, we use it each year to navigate the long road from g'nut, degradation, to shevach, praise. We plot our journey, from Kadeish to karpas, from egg to charoset, trailing crumbs of matzoh for each other to follow. We trace it through tears, sweat, struggles for equality, wins small and big, hope diminishing and hope growing, and occasional game-changers at which we can only marvel. Each year, around every family's seder table, the features and markers on it look slightly different. Last year, in my home, we told a story marked by the closed doors of COVID, the icebergs of substance abuse, and the miracle of vaccines. This year, new events and their symbolic language will pepper our seder's story. But the destination of the journey does not change. The road on our Pesach map always leads to a settlement called "Freedom."

Freedom is never stationary. Never finished, never to be taken for granted. It takes all of our kavannah (intention), all of our ratzon (willpower), and all of our m'od (utmost) to make freedom more than a phantom settlement—to make it tangible. Yet we must first dream it to reach it. Every spring, we draw and follow the map that will get us to freedom. In your own seders on April 15 and in our Zoomed community seder on April 16, once the cups of wine or grape juice have been drunk, the story told, the food eaten, the blessings recited, may your seder have been a "map [that] made part of the world real, at least for a little bit."

Chag hacheirut sameiach—wishing us all a joyful holiday of breathing, singing, hugging, tasting freedom!

#### RABBINIC INTERN ELLI'S REFLECTIONS



Hello everyone!

As I write this, we're wrapping up our Purim celebrations and looking forward to celebrating Passover. Crocuses are beginning to bloom, and we head from the book of Exodus into the book of Leviticus. We are on the edge of ending and beginnings,

looking forward to what is blooming and looking back to the history of our ancestors.

When I considered what to write, I started thinking about the connection between Purim and Passover, and one word came to me. Courage. Brené Brown, a favorite thinker, researcher and storyteller of mine, says this about how to define courage:

Courage is a heart word. The root of the word courage is cor—the Latin word for heart. In one of its earliest forms, the word courage meant "To speak one's mind by telling all one's heart." Over time, this definition has changed, and today, we typically associate courage with heroic and brave deeds. But in my opinion, this definition fails to recognize the inner strength and level of commitment required for us to actually speak honestly and openly about who we are and about our experiences—good and bad. Speaking from our hearts is what I think of as "ordinary courage."\*

Indeed, speaking from the heart is what both Esther and Moses do, as Esther reveals herself and as Moses asks for the freedom of his people. They are both somewhat disconnected from Jewish identity, have lived in palaces, and have hidden themselves and run away from themselves. In moving back toward their lives and identities, they claim both their people and themselves.

This month, I hope to think more about how I can bring ordinary courage into my own life and to speak my mind by telling my heart. Is there a place you would like to consider what it means to do this in your own life? What might you tell and to whom?

As it is customary to throw away all the flour in our kitchens, cleaning out our physical spaces, how can we also clear and speak our hearts as we head into Passover this year?

May we all find the ability to speak our hearts and minds as one.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



It has been a few months since I've last written an article for the bulletin, and I wanted to update you on some transitions occurring over the next few months

As you know, Nancy is retiring on June 30. We have interviewed some very strong candidates to succeed her, and we hope

to hire someone shortly who can work with Nancy over the next few months for training.

We are also saying farewell to Eunice Miller. As the instructor of our youngest religious school class, Eunice has brought much joy to her students, their families, and everyone in the community over the past twenty-nine years. Please join me in congratulating Eunice for her years of service.

We have finally been granted our 501(c)3 status by the IRS. This status will allow the temple to apply for state and federal grants. We should also see cost savings associated with multiple vendors. I would like to thank attorney Glenn A. Frederick for completing the hundred-page application and keeping me updated as to its progress.

I am also very happy to report that we have relaxed our masking mandate; masks are no longer required in the building, but feel free to continue wearing one if you choose. While more services will be held in the building, we will also continue to stream them via Zoom. (Please consider joining the Zoom tech team to help ensure that we can keep offering services remotely.)

As we move back into the building, we want to be mindful of those in our community with food allergies. The board of directors has approved a new <u>food allergy policy</u>, developed at my request by Claire Breger-Belsky and Paula Breger. The policy, designed to minimize the risk to those with food allergies, prohibits peanuts and tree nuts from being brought into the building and requires that all foods brought into the building be labeled for any of the nine major allergens (excluding peanuts, tree nuts, and shellfish, which are not allowed).

The final transition I want to mention will take place at our annual meeting on May 22. It has been my honor and privilege to serve our community over these past four years as your president. We have endured the pandemic and I believe we have come out stronger as a community. I am certain that our new president, Jennifer Lampron, will an outstanding leader for our community.



#### Spotlight on Lisa Herzl, Social Action Committee Chair

Lisa Herzl joined Temple Emanu-El in 2021 and serves as the chair of our Social Action Committee. Lisa teaches history at Triton Regional High School; she lives in North Andover with

her husband, Andy; son, Gideon; and supermellow rescue dog, Ruby. Lisa's an expert knitter and also enjoys yoga, cooking tasty vegetarian food, and (when not in the middle of a pandemic), travel.

Lisa is originally from Kingston, New York, where she and her family were part of a large temple community and Lisa's life was saturated with Judaism—"I only officially learned about Christmas when I went to kindergarten!" Sometimes Lisa and her brother got to sit in on her mother's preschool classroom. Lisa's family moved to South Burlington, Vermont, when she was nine or ten. During high school, she was on the speech and debate team and volunteered with elementary and middle school students. Undergraduate work was at the University of Vermont, where she majored in history and

education and met her husband, Andy, a Rowley native and enthusiastic hockey player. Lisa continued her community service work throughout college; she volunteered to bring greyhounds who'd been rescued from New Hampshire racing tracks to visit nursing homes, so they could re-socialize before adoption. She also enjoyed casual Shabbat experiences, weekend bagels, challah-making, and holiday programming at the UVM Hillel, appreciating the diversity of the campus.

Lisa knew from a young age that a desk job was not for her. She's always loved to teach, volunteering in the Hebrew school of her temple for her bat mitzvah project. Lisa was drawn to

history by "how much there is to discover." She thrives on the challenge, in a highly charged political climate, of figuring out how to talk with her students about hard topics in a way that invites conversation and how to help them learn the skill of civil disagreement. For six years she taught a course on genocide, including the Sho'ah, Rwanda, the Armenian genocide, and Native American history. Lisa loves both the "teachable moments" and the "lightbulb moments" of history class. She says, "My goal isn't to change minds, but to plant the seed."

Lisa met Cantor Vera at the Andover/North Andover YMCA at a kids' swim class. Cantor Vera was the first female cantor Lisa had ever met. She looked at our website, appreciated the site and the clear dedication


to social justice and social action, and we stayed on her mind. As the isolation of COVID started to lift last winter when vaccines became available, Lisa decided it was time to join. She particularly enjoys Pajama Havdalah: comfortable attire, a fun kid-oriented evening, and a service that she loves. 



It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.
