"The King is in the Field"

Dear chevre,

In a story by Yiddish writer Sholem Asch, masterfully translated by Miriam Udel, a young, illiterate shepherd named Yashek tries to pray with the words of the siddur (prayerbook), but fears that he'll never be able to address God.

"But occasionally when the sky, clear and bright, rested dreamily in a flowing blue veil; and the grass grew peacefully, with each blade rooted in the earth and gazing quietly into the sky; and across the way stood the old rampart, the green grandfather of the village; and beyond that, the road stretched on amid the grasses—a wagon rolled along, and somebody was going far, far away.... And up above, the sky also extended far and wide, sinking lower and lower until it lay at the door of the barn, watching.... At such times, it seemed to him, God had slipped out for a little while from the lords and nobles and had himself come into the field, stretched out, and lay waiting...

Then Yashek felt like giving thanks and praising everything all around him.

And occasionally he wanted to walk all the way until he reached the big city, where God dwelt and where his palace stood! 'I want to go and kiss God's hand,' he thought.

Quickly, though, he sighed and wondered, 'But would they let me?'" $^{\!\prime\prime\prime\prime}$

The story's main image comes from Ecclesiastes 5:8: God as a king who from time to time—and most particularly, during the month of Elul—comes out from the status-dependent, inaccessible palace to the community and workplace of the laborers in the field. "The king is in the field" became a touchstone for the Chasidic movement. We don't need magic passwords of siddur language and long, expensive time spent studying Talmud to be in fervent and loving relationship with God, this story suggests. The Chasidic master Rabbi Schneur Zalman of Liadi draws on the Birkat Kohanim, the Priestly Blessing, to bring God's shining face into the field. "We go out to receive the light of His countenance in the field, so to speak, as it is written: 'God will cause His countenance to shine upon you' (Numbers 6:25)."² As in Elul we do the messy, necessary work of t'shuvah in the "fields" of our daily lives, God also is coming out to meet us where we are. Both we and God make an effort to get face-to-face.

We don't need magic passwords of siddur language and long, expensive time studying Talmud to be in fervent and loving relationship with God.

I too find God most accessible and apparent in natural, open spaces. And I love the reciprocity of the human-divine relationship that "God in the field"

allows for. I need this metaphor particularly in Elul, when the weight and awe of the High Holy Days is imminent, in all of their pomp and length and complexity. On the High Holy Days, our liturgy gives voice to our own spiritual doubts: will we be able to "kiss God's hand"? God is coming out from the palace walls toward us not only out of mercy, but because these meetings in the field are also life-giving to God. The medieval Spanish commentator Ibn Ezra writes of the original verse in Ecclesiastes that the King (God) is sustained by the field. The produce of our soul-work, our t'shuvah, and the moments of beaming, direct, often wordless interaction that we and God can find together are food for the Divine soul. Access to us sustains God too.

In Asch's story, Yashek develops a piercing whistle as his own form of prayer as he guards his flock. "And God understood him. God understood his prayer very well! He only whistled when he felt like whistling to God,



when he felt that he needed to whistle..."³ When Rosh HaShanah comes, Yashek brings his whistle-prayer into the synagogue at the most solemn, fearful moment of the Mussaf K'dushat HaYom. Yashek finds himself able to access God, in his own way, when he most needs to, even in a daunting setting, and his prayer carries the congregation's up with it straight to the heavens.

As we approach the High Holy Days, we strive together as a community to cultivate a prayer environment of both splendor and accessibility. We are blessed in this work by our new rabbinic intern, Elli Pripas, and our shaliach tzibbur, Phil Platcow. Each one of us has the opportunity to prepare. I hope you'll spend some time this month thinking about what might help you meet the source of the universe's wonder "in the field," and how you might bring some of that feeling into our services with you. Is it a favorite walk? A melody? A beloved Rosh HaShanah recipe? Yoga? Bare feet? Connecting with a particular friend or family member? Self-exploration through writing? (Email me by August 8 if that's your jam; we'll start a community Elul writing practice on Rosh Chodesh Elul, August 9!) Our machzor, our prayerbook, helps shape our verbal prayers to God. But in the field and in the synagogue too, every expression of our hearts is seen and understood. Our task is to try to pray, in whatever way our need shapes, and to trust that God will understand us very well.

Fall Classes from Cantor Vera

Cantor Vera is gauging interest for two new classes for the coming year:

• Adult b'nei mitzvah, which will start after Simchat Torah and meet roughly every other week through the end of Spring 2022

For adult Jews of Temple Emanu-El who have not yet celebrated becoming b'nei mitzvah. As a class we'll explore the history and traditions of b'nei mitzvah ceremonies, study Torah and Haftarah trope as well as some of the prayers of Shabbat morning, and prepare together for an adult b'nei mitzvah celebration. Each person in our community belongs on our bimah; come prepare together to claim your space! This course is for members of Temple Emanu-El.

• Liturgy of Shabbat morning, which will start after Simchat Torah

This nine-week course will dive into key moments in the Saturday morning service. We'll learn about the prayers, explore their language, and learn how to chant and sing them. Topics will include Birchat HaShachar, Baruch She'amar, Psalm 150, Nishmat Kol Chai, Bar'chu through the Sh'ma, the beginning of the Amidah, the start of the Torah service, Aleinu, and Adon Olam. This course is open to the wider community.


MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Spotlight on Sharyn Russell, Chesed Committee Chair

Sharyn Russell, who lives in Haverhill, joined Temple Emanu-El in 1980. She has a diverse professional history that includes textiles and social work. For fun, she takes daily walks, tends her plot in the community garden, and enjoys trips into Boston for music, theatre, and museums. Sharyn is also an avid cook, baker, reader, and Red Sox fan. Her daughter, Rebecca, attended Solomon Schechter Day School here at Temple Emanu-El from preschool through sixth grade and now practices social work in New Orleans.

Sharyn grew up in Brooklyn, with her mother's parents, tailors from Russia, in her home. She holds master's degrees in textile research from NYU and social work from Simmons. She moved from New York to Brookline, Amesbury, and finally Haverhill in

1980 (when Rebecca was born). Sharyn got her start in social work at Anna Jaques Hospital. She ran her own business as a geriatric care manager for twenty years and found great fulfillment in the opportunities the work gave her to support her clients and their families and in her wonderful colleagues.


programs that Chesed can help make, please get in touch.



Rebecca's baby naming at Temple Emanu-El was Sharyn's first formal Jewish involvement. After Schechter, Rebecca went to Hillel Day School in Marblehead for two years and was the first exchange student from Haverhill High School when she studied in Israel for a semester. On a memorable, intergenerational congregational Israel trip led by Rabbi Korinow in 1992, Rebecca celebrated becoming bat mitzvah at the historic Jewish fortress Masada. When Sharyn and her former husband decided to raise Rebecca with a strong Jewish education and community, "we gave her a gift," Sharyn says.

Rebecca's time at Schechter, and a warm friendship with Rabbi Korinow and Gail (z"I), were foundational for Sharyn's Jewish experience. "[Jewish practice is] so integral to my life now, I can't imagine not having it, and I didn't grow up with it. ... It's given me so many ways to process

my life experiences and lifelong friends to process them with, celebrations and rituals. I have Shabbos dinners every week now with people who I've known since our kids were three years old." Sharyn gets up early for the morning services of the High Holy Days to listen to Phil Platcow daven. "It transforms me."

It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.


Summer Office Hours

Avoid Email Scams (Phishing)

Communications from Temple Emanu-El will always come from an **@TempleEmanu-El.org** email address. Most—bulletins, Shavuons, bereavement notices, religious school messages—will come through Constant Contact, though some may come directly from individuals at the temple such as Cantor Vera, Rabbi Rachel, or Nancy.

Examine all emails carefully:

- Check for odd sender email addresses.
- Are there spelling and grammar errors?
- Are they asking you to take an unusual action?
- Are there unexpected links or attachments?

If you are unsure about an email:

- Don't click on any links.
- Don't open attachments.
- Don't reply to the sender.

- Block the sender, or mark the email as junk.
- Delete the email from your computer.
