Dear chevre,



Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, approaches! And we have an additional reason to celebrate: Mindy Harris has rejoined our temple's professional team, as religious school director! We are utterly delighted to have Mindy back with us in this new role, using her phenomenal skills and experience as a Jewish educator, her wonderful energy and ruach (spirit), and the love she shares with our community to lead and guide our religious school and

partner with our teachers and families. B'ruchah haba'ah—welcome back, Mindy, and we are blessed to have you!

We have abundant opportunities to light and bless Chanukah candles together this year: the religious school party on the morning of Sunday, December 18; the City of Haverhill lighting in Washington Square at 6:00 pm on Tuesday, December 20; the lighting of our own Kenneth H. Salk Memorial Chanukiah on Wednesday, December 21, with our choir; and our Chanukah Shabbat Friday evening service on December 23. We'll light the candles that celebrate the twin miracles of Jewish survival and public Jewish celebration, and we'll do so with pride.

At the beginning of the Interfaith Thanksgiving service last month at Groveland Congregational UCC, I lit a tall pillar candle. Additional candles burned behind it on the altar, and, shielded by glass lamps, in the long windows along the church. I watched the flames with mixed emotions. Candles in winter dark—watching the steady dance of the light warms the heart and focuses the mind. They beautifully symbolized the comforting sense of community trust and mutual affirmation that our service brought together. And it was Transgender Day of Remembrance. And the night before, a man had walked with muzzles blazing into Club Q, an LGBTQ+ bar in Colorado Springs. The candles danced with the brightness of those souls and bodies now taken from this world.

In the past two years, Americans from politicians to hate groups to private individuals have leveled deeply denigrating discrimination against the LGBTQ+ community, threatening civil rights and the protection of human rights. Our corner of the country has seen it too. I think of the LGBTQ+ youth "Over the Rainbow" dance in Newburyport this May that had to change

venues after a candidate for state senate led an outcry against it, and the small but loud and scary protests in Massachusetts this summer against drag gueen story hours. The white supremacist hate group NSC-131, whose

activity forced a drag queen story hour cancellation in the Seaport, is explicitly neo-Nazi and antisemitic. So are the Proud Boys and Patriot Front, who also targeted LGBTQ+ events this summer. Homophobia, transphobia, and antisemitism: different nodules of the same cancer of hate. When I heard the news about Club Q, my nerves were still humming from the active shooter response training in which our community had joined Congregation Beth Israel just a few days before. My body felt the truth of intersectionality: attacks on one of us, on one marginalized identity, are attacks on us all.

Homophobia and transphobia, like antisemitism, are not harmless "opinions." They're not reasonable sides in a debate. They are injurious hate and, unless named and countered, can become deadly. All it takes sometimes is a spark—and lethal weaponry close to hand—to set off devastation.

We have choices every day. Which flames do we tend? Let's choose to see the unique beauty and worth of each soul and body, living b'tzelem Elohim, in God's image. Let's affirm and protect the brightness of our LGBTQ+ community members.

We have a practical toolkit for pursuing these goals. Use an individual's chosen language to describe them. Seek out, lift up, and listen carefully to LGBTQ+ voices and stories. Attend and support programming created by and for the queer community. Let your legislators and elected officials know that LGBTQ+ safety and representation are priorities for you. Donate to organizations that support LGBTQ+ safety, creativity, and flourishing; among many, many phenomenal organizations, I'll mention that Keshet is Jewish and local to Boston, and the Trevor Project is lifesaving and national. Let's

quench the conflagrations of fear that threaten the safety of our beloved community.

Vayikra (Leviticus) 18:22 prohibits male sexual relationships with other men. It has long been used as a foundational text for homophobia. It comes from our Torah. I believe that obligates us to own that text, acknowledge the harm it has caused, and with our words and our actions counter the homophobia it has supported. At the same time, we are blessed with a Jewish history that recognizes six genders in the Talmud and movingly portrays love between people of the same gender in the stories of Ruth and Naomi and David and Jonathan. We are blessed with an American rabbinic tradition that has recently, by and large, striven to promote human dignity and happiness over adherence to this verse. We can own these things too, and take strength from them.

I am grateful for our sense of Torah as a living learning, Torah that learns from us even as we learn from it. I am grateful that our tradition revels in the potential each individual and generation hold I'takein olam, to change and fix what causes harm in the world. As this secular year comes to a close, I pray we may all take that power and use it so that this year's violence against the LGBTQ+ community does not repeat.

We hold one another's dignity in our hands. Let's tend those sacred flames, so that people of every gender and every sexual orientation may, like the Jews in our Chanukah story, survive and thrive, and sing of that victory.

GREATEST GENERATION SPOTLIGHT

Spotlight on Joyce Cohen

Joyce (Greenstein) Cohen has been a member of Temple Emanu-El since our founding in 1937. She grew up in Haverhill with her father, Max z"l; her mother, Clare z"l (originally of Malden); and her brother, John z"l. Joyce lives in Haverhill; her

son, Steven, his wife, and her grandson, Jeremy, live in New Jersey, while her granddaughter, Rebecca, is in Washington, DC. Joyce spent a long and prestigious career in teaching in the Haverhill schools for over fifty years as a reading specialist (at one point she was Haverhill's longest-tenured teacher). Reading remains one of her greatest passions, along with travel, movies, skiing, bingo and pechino, and text study.

Joyce's grandfather Morris z"I came over from Europe as a child and started a shoe factory on River Street. With the help of nuns who brought

him to St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Brighton, Morris survived a terrible factory accident in his 20s that took his arm. Morris went on to become the president of the Children of Israel cemetery and a father of four. He passed his factory down to his son Max, "Mickey." Mickey was a charter member of Temple Emanu-El; Joyce and her brother John went to Hebrew school here growing up ("I wish I'd had more," Joyce says!), and John celebrated becoming bar mitzvah.

Joyce's childhood was filled with athletic activities, including horseback riding and swimming at camp in the summers. She graduated from Haverhill High School, spent one year of college at Ohio State, then transferred to Brandeis to complete her undergraduate degree. Joyce married young and soon welcomed her son, Steven. She came back to Haverhill and began work at the Nettle School as a substitute teacher for sixth graders, later transitioning to a reading specialist role with kindergartners and first graders. Teaching suited her. When Steven was seven years old, Joyce began studying for her master's in education at Salem State, which she earned after five years of graduate studies at night, working full-time during the day. (She suggests young adults enjoy their work for

a while before starting a family!) Haverhill Mayor James Fiorentini's father worked with Joyce, and he drove the five teachers in the night school master's program over to Salem. Somehow, Joyce, with her mother's help, made time to get

Steven hooked on skiing at an early age, taking him up to North Conway and Waterville Valley.


Joyce loved her work. "It was socially interesting. There were always people to talk to and eat with." She co-taught with homeroom teachers in their classrooms, and she particularly enjoyed testing every single incoming kindergarten student one on one to assess their literacy skills. Joyce was loath to retire; after retirement, she willingly returned to teach fourth grade for a year at Haverhill Public Schools' request.

Joyce got more involved with Temple Emanu-El after her parents' deaths. Shirley Yanku z"I introduced her to Marcelle Greenbaum at a Temple program. Dottie Tye z"I invited Joyce to weekly parashah study, where she started meeting people: Gerda Kalman, Alma Klinetsky, Esther Rosen z"I. Joyce started coming regularly to Saturday services to say Kaddish for her parents, staying to enjoy kiddush and parashah study. She got involved with adult education and was a devoted participant in the temple's book group. While her mother's health prevented Joyce from joining the temple's Israel trip in 1992, even a mending broken hip could not keep her from Rabbi Korinow's three-day New York City trip for adult Temple members. They went to Park Slope, took in some Broadway shows, and visited a kosher supermarket; Joyce loved every minute!

Today, Joyce is once again a Saturday morning regular at our services over Zoom. She likes the singing and the rituals of aliyot and g'lilah, and is a willing m'targemet, reader of the Torah's English translation. She stays active, going out to eat on Wednesdays, taking in all the entertainment and participating in the programs that her building offers. We appreciate your history and present of strong learning with our temple, Joyce, and are glad to learn more about you!




