Dear friends,

Purim is the time in our Jewish year when the world —laws, customs, visual presentations—stands on its head. One of my teachers at Hebrew College would indeed mark the morning prayers of Adar, the Hebrew month in which Purim falls, by doing headstands in the beit midrash, the study hall and

prayer space. Another friend revolutionized my own Purim practices, during my first year at school, by sharing that Purim is sometimes called "yom treif": to most disrupt norms, some Jews choose to make it the one day a year when they eat food that's not kosher. Purim is a day on which we upset expectations.

I think that this upset is actually a healthy, Jewish kind of coping mechanism. We can get dangerously accustomed to the habit of sadness, even to shutting down after experiencing repeated trauma. A big raucous party, unusually goofy behavior, costumes and roles, and the disorientation of it all, can jolt us out of those habits. Purim makes this a ritualized, communal experience with people you know and trust and with safeguards in place. (Even so, Purim party frolicking is not everyone's cup of Manischewitz. That's okay too.)

And let's not forget the laughter. We make fun of our world and ourselves, let all the ironies and farces and heartbreaks hang out while still asserting, in a triumphant Purim narrative painted with the broadest of strokes, that it will all come out right in the end. Laughter, too, is healing. Our matriarch Sarah models this for us, as her disbelieving laughter at the idea of pregnancy at an advanced age becomes the delighted laughter of her son at play, happily defying her own expectations.

The Purim story casts balked expectations as its savior. Esther the queen reveals herself to the king as a member of the most persecuted minority in Persia. The Jews pounce preemptively on their plotting enemies and nahafoch hu, the outcome is reversed. Jews go from victims to violent conquerors in the space of those two words. The adrenaline alone is enough to get one tipsy, never mind what we do (or don't) pour into our Purim cups. Purim is a day when, as Pastor Kenneth Young so powerfully preached on Martin Luther King Shabbat, despite all reasons for the

contrary, *"hafachta* misp'di l'machol li"—we find our mourning *turned* into dancing (Psalm 30, emphasis mine).

But Purim's not a day for drowning out the world we live in with shouts of triumph. It's a day for looking at it from a different position—lying on the floor weak with laughter, or suspended upside-down on a jungle gym, or reclining sideways on a couch like a monarch for a day. Different information emerges from a different perspective. Mary Crowe of Care Dimensions, who taught us last month about caring for ourselves and others during COVID, spoke about the importance of a perspective flip. When she is frustrated and feeling stuck and helpless, she said, she tries to focus on what she can do, what blessings she does benefit from. Unable to hug her mother, who's in a care facility, because of COVID restrictions, Mary cultivates gratitude that her mom is being cared for in a ground-floor room with a window outside of which Mary can stand and talk to her.

This kind of perspective shift is a very difficult thing to do. It takes practice, and diligence, to figure out how to stand where we can see the blessings between the burdens. Purim is our most dramatic, flamboyant day of practicing that skill, letting ourselves get so loose that "cursed be Haman" sounds like "blessed be Mordechai." But it's a transferable skill, and when we use it during our regular lives, we can also turn curses into blessings—or at least let the blessings take up more space in our field of vision.

Of course, there are folks for whom the struggle to simply survive precludes spending energy on a perspective flip. Purim asks us to attend to their needs too, with the custom of sending matanot la'evyonim, gifts to the needy: the other half of exuberance's coin. For the past two years we've collected money on Purim for Yad Chessed, an organization that helps indigent Jews buy food, make it through moments of intense financial hardship, and celebrate the holidays, with dignity. This year all of your donations can be made remotely—please see the informational box inside this bulletin to make a Purim gift, if you're moved and able.

While we wait for the ravaging tide of the coronavirus to turn back on itself, we focus on what each of us can do. Whether that's giving to someone in need, counting your blessings in the teeth of your losses, or simply standing on your head—may this holy Adar, this month of turning and turning and doubling down on hope, help your gaze shift and your breath expand.

Marbim l'simcha—may our joy increase! Cantor Vera

RABBI RACHEL'S MESSAGE



Shalom chevraya,

What a crazy few weeks! By the time you read this I truly hope that there's been a smooth and nonviolent transition of power in the White House, and that the vaccine has begun to be more widely distributed. The nonstop challenges and losses resulting from COVID-19, the reckoning with systemic racism, the election, and most recently the insurrection in Washington, DC, have left us reeling. There literally hasn't been an opportunity to catch our breath! Perhaps this feeling of relentlessness is due in part to the fact that we are experiencing time itself very differently during

COVID-19. The sameness of the days and the ongoing disruption of our "normal" lives give rise to the feeling that we're living in a "time out of time."

One of our new habits regarding time is that we tend to measure it by when the "world ended" last March. I always recoil at that phrase, since obviously the world didn't end—it was just fundamentally altered. But there is no disputing the dramatic before and after the moment when our lives ground to a halt. The reality that we've been carrying on like this for almost an entire year is difficult to wrap our minds around. But, yes, later this month we will celebrate Purim, which was the last time we gathered together as a community in person. We all have our memories of that week and the last time we were in person with people in public without masks, hand sanitizer, and a distance of at least six feet.

It is perhaps ironic that we will forever associate Purim with the virus-induced shutdown given that the main theme of the Purim story is reversal of fortune. On the thirteen of the month of Adar, the very day that the Jews were supposed to be exterminated, the opposite happened and the Jews ended up ruling over their enemies. The Hebrew phrase referencing this reversal in the Book of Esther—וְנָהֻפּוֹךְ הוּא translated as "the opposite happened," or "it was turned to the contrary." Colloquially, we may say that the pandemic to things "going sideways," meaning not as expected. Surely, we could never have predicted the extent to which the pandemic would turn our lives upside down.

Biblical scholar Avivah Gottlieb Zornberg describes the book of Esther as also occurring in a sort of "time out of time," in contrast to prior Biblical narratives. She notes how the events take place in a vacuum with no connection to the past or the future, and prior meaning-making is stripped away since our survival for the first time is not a result of divine intervention. According to Zornberg, the Esther story marks a historical turn in our national narrative from a humanized gloss on time with one narrative arc logically following another—all as part of God's plan—to a more contingent narrative that necessarily remains focused on the present.

The parallels between the Purim story and COVID-19 are several. They both mark a great turning in our collective narrative, they both involve a turning upside down of the way the world works, and they both force a reckoning that is focused on the present moment. I look forward to celebrating Purim with you and continuing to be present together in whatever the future holds.

Spotlight on Max Gofstein









Honor Your Father and Your Mother


It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.

The one-time cost of the plaque is \$300. To purchase a plaque in honor of a departed loved one, contact Nancy or Cantor Vera at 978.373.3861.

Avoid Email Scams (Phishing)

Communications from Temple Emanu-El will always come from an **@TempleEmanu-El.org** email address. Most—bulletins, Shavuons, bereavement notices, religious school messages—will come through Constant Contact, though some may come directly from individuals at the temple such as Cantor Vera, Rabbi Rachel, or Nancy.

Examine all emails carefully:

- Check for odd sender email addresses.
- Are there spelling and grammar errors?
- Are they asking you to take an unusual action?
- Are there unexpected links or attachments?

If you are unsure about an email:

- Don't click on any links.
- Don't open attachments.
- Don't reply to the sender.
