Dear ones,

Happy 2023! A new secular year has begun. We're stepping gingerly into it (possibly through some snowdrifts) and turning our thoughts to what new possibilities the year may bring.

We call this Jewish year, 5783, the year of hakheil, gathering. Hakheil takes its name from D'varim 31:12, the

next-to-last commandment in Torah from God to the people Israel. God says: At the end of every sh'mita year (the remission of debts and leaving the land fallow that occurs each seventh year), gather the entire population together for a public reading of Torah. Folks of every gender and of every age and of every social and legal status are to come together for this. The word "hakheil" has the same root as the word "k'hillah," community. Gathering together to engage with Torah, to engage with lived Judaism is what creates that community.

That command—gather together, hakheil—is for us. Right here in Haverhill, right now, right when we need it most. We've been dispersed for almost three years. COVID forced us all out of our building, and many of our community members remain cautious about returning in person because of its continuing risks. We also collectively lost the habit of coming to shul regularly during the worst of COVID; first we got used to coming on Zoom, then we got tired of Zoom, and many of us just let regular attendance go.

That command-gather together, hakheil-is for us. Right here in Haverhill, right now, right when we need it most.

Let this new year, this year of hakheil, inspire you to come more frequently to our services, classes, and other events—and, if you are comfortable doing so, come in person. Pick one activity that you love or that you're curious about, come to it at least twice, and ask one friend to come with you! We have an amazing community. Our gatherings, our classes, our services, our religious school, our adult education, and the work of our committees are all outstanding. Our temple community is a place where connection, prayer, learning, song, and mitzvot all coalesce into a warm and nurturing social environment. I think you've all felt this. You're reading this message because you are invested in and excited by our community. When you talk with an old friend or someone you've just met at kiddush (yes, we have kiddush and oneg again), you feel cared for and you just might learn something new. When you share your perspective with our community members on the Torah portion or Jewish values in action or material we're learning together in a class, you feel the validation of having expressed something important to you to people

who care about you and share your interest in it. When your voice rings out in song with people around you, you feel spirits lifting and the beautiful sounds and meanings of our prayers resonating in your body.

You are the essential ingredient in all that we do. We need you!

The theme of our joint Martin Luther King Jr. Shabbat service with Calvary Baptist Church—back in person for the first time since 2020—is *Rebuilding*. And to rebuild, our community needs each one of you. We need you to come to shul and hear the words of Torah from our scroll, or from a friend or a new acquaintance, over a hot drink or through an act of chesed (lovingkindness) or tikkun olam (repairing the world). We need you to come and share your own words of Torah. Taking a leadership role in a service is a great way to get yourself back into the swing of Shabbat participation; let me know if there's a reading, sermonizing, ritual action, or prayer-leading part you'd like, and stay tuned for an email later this month with a more explicit rundown of leadership opportunities!

We recognize that attending in person still carries potential risks, and can be downright impossible for some. Based on the results of the poll that went out in late December, we are going to require masks at some of our services this month and will continue to use masking as a tool this winter and beyond, to make it easier for folks to access our services in person. We are also committed to maintaining the hybrid option for our services and most of our other programs and classes. In January, the following services will be masks-required (clergy, choir, and folks leading/reading from the bimah will have the option to unmask if they wish):

- Saturday, January 7 (Mishkan T'filah service)
- Friday, January 13 (MLK Shabbat service)
- Saturday, January 28 (Sim Shalom service)

If you are not feeling well before any service or event, please care for yourself and our community by participating via Zoom.

Jewish community is a team venture. Let myself and President Jenn Lampron know how you want to show up and participate. Our temple life is up and doing, and we want you to be a part of it!

Shalom Chaverim,

As I pen this bulletin article on the evening of the winter solstice, as the deep chill of winter sets in, I am reflecting on the shortness of the days and the resulting darkness which permeates my commutes to and from work. The dark and cold can feel isolating if we don't have the company and spirit of others around us. But we know that longer days are ahead of us; every day means a little more light. GREATEST GENERATION SPOTLIGHT

Spotlight on Gerry Shyavitz

Gerry Shyavitz has been a member of Temple Emanu-El since 1942. He is a part-time lawyer who specializes in estate planning and does some work for the IRS. He and his beloved wife, Pearl, live in Haverhill; they have two daughters, Abby (of Montreal) and Sara (of Waltham, Vermont), and four grandchildren, Londynn, Aurora, Bradley, and Mia.

Gerry grew up in Haverhill, with parents Moses "Mosie" and Madelyn z"l and his younger siblings, John z"l and Anne. He'd bike to the Walnut Square school (no bike lock needed) and join his mother's parents, Samuel and Fannie Porton, in Lowell for Shabbat dinners and services at Temple Beth-El. Summers were spent by the ocean in Salisbury; the family had a beach house right next door to Aunt Minnie Tye. When Gerry was twelve years old, he left Haverhill for the Rectory School in Connecticut, and then at fourteen he transferred to Holderness in New Hampshire. Gerry took Hebrew with Father Clark at

Rectory and came back to Haverhill for a "quickie" bar mitzvah on a Thursday morning. Gerry has fond memories of both schools and, though the lone Jew at Rectory, says, "I never found any antisemitism, only love." He graduated from Middlebury College in Vermont. During those years, his younger siblings were sometimes his plus twos on dates!

Gerry became a lawyer, working in Mosie's office. Mosie began life in a poor immigrant family from Kosovo, Poland. Gerry's aunt Minnie changed her family's name from "Tikotsky" to "Tye" when her three boys reached college age, to avert antisemitism. Mosie worked at Allen Shoe for cousin Sam Tye, dedicated himself to his law practice, and rose to become assistant city solicitor. Gerry remembers Mosie once commuting to his office on Merrimack Street during a flood, by rowboat. Mosie was generous with his expertise—a "fixer"—and an enthusiastic lay prayer leader at temple; his example and intense influence steered Gerry firmly into law. Gerry says, "He was God to me."

While in law school, Gerry met Pearl at the Haverhill Country Club. "In the swim club I saw this absolutely beautiful girl in a blue bathing suit, then I found out she was Jewish and I really wanted to date her." Pearl had just been set up with Gerry's best friend; they came to his house for a dinner party that evening, and Gerry insisted on joining them for drinks at the

Burrow afterwards! Pearl worked as a school teacher, rooming in Boston with the daughter of our temple's first rabbi, Rabbi Jacobson. Gerry waited til she and his friend were no longer dating to ask her out, and six months after their first date they were married.


When Mosie died standing up to make an objection at a hearing in City Hall, Gerry took over the law practice and developed on his own as a lawyer. "Not until I was on my own did I come into my own." Madelyn traveled more after Mosie's death, particularly with Dottie Tye through the Elderhostel (now Road Scholar) program. She adored the theater and

education, volunteered throughout Haverhill, and served in Sisterhood, Hadassah, and the local Brandeis chapter here at Temple Emanu-El. Gerry took leadership roles here as well; he served as president of B'nai Brith and on the board of directors with his good friend Steve Shain. Gerry remembers those years as "two kids on the board," agitating—sometimes alone—for the changes they felt would be beneficial for the community.

Gerry's Judaism is a source of meaning and strength in his life. He says "I'm very loyal. I love being Jewish. I'm so proud of our history, and our resilience. Never giving up fighting—being a minority and standing out. I'm proud of the humanity of Judaism. I think my kindness came from my Judaism (and my parents). I get a thrill out of doing something for someone, and having them appreciate it." Thank you for sharing your story, your philosophy, and your extensive Haverhill history and insights with us, Gerry!



The Spiral Shell: A French Village Reveals Its Secrets of Jewish Resistance in World War II


