Dear chevre,

When I lived in Western Massachusetts, sugaring season became my favorite time of the year. Each February, Mike and I made a pilgrimage to a sugar house for at least one big pancake breakfast, returning home triumphant, licking our lips and our fingers, with a jug of maple sap distilled down into pure sweetness. We learned to watch the weather carefully each January—would a thaw properly warm the tree blood, thin it, and give the whole system an

extra injection of sunlight? Would the hard freezes return after, as they should, to send the tree back into the mode of storage and sugar production? Maple trees need that alternation of warm and cold to set the sap cycling properly, sugar leaping up through the xylem of the trees. A winter where the temperature stays even will not see a good sugaring-off. Constant cold or warmth may make our wardrobe choices easier but seriously disrupts the natural maple sap cycle.

This January, Tu biShvat, the birthday of the trees, falls on the same weekend as Martin Luther King Jr. Shabbat (and Shabbat Shirah, with special choral contributions to our Saturday morning service!). We can learn from the trees as we consider our society's lurching (at best) gains in advancing racial justice and equity in every arena from healthcare access to criminal justice to hiring to voting. We can learn from the trees as we digest the bitter news of the omicron variant's virulence and face another winter of uncertainty just as the expansion of vaccinations and booster shots seemed poised to let us relax a little closer to normal. Our spirits rose and fell—and are hovering now, unsure of which direction our country and our pandemic will take us in. What was safe a few weeks ago might not be safe now. Information comes in confusing floods, and the disorientation is familiar but no easier.

Thinking about ourselves as trees for a ritual hour can teach us to ride our world's ups and downs with greater hope, allowing ourselves to grow from the vigor of the contrasts rather than to be exhausted by trying to control them.

In place of the confusion, I invite you to tap into a feeling of being rooted. Our blood is running in our veins, cycling through our own cells, carrying sugar with it, just as the sap does. Tu biShvat invites us to think of ourselves as different kinds of fruit, even as trees. At our Zoom Tu biShvat seder with several other local congregations, I hope that each taste of fruit and each sip of wine or grape juice will help us live a little more in our bodies. Rituals help remind us that, as a Jewish people, we are rooted in a cycle longer than any one winter or pandemic.

Thinking about ourselves as trees for a ritual hour can teach us to ride our world's ups and downs with greater hope, allowing us to grow from the vigor of the contrasts rather than to be exhausted by trying to control them.

Judaism reminds us, through Kohelet (Ecclesiastes), that in different times, different actions and attitudes are needed, opposites right up against one another: planting and uprooting, tearing down and building up, hugging each other and keeping far from one another's arms (Kohelet 3:1–5). In the words of the Reverend Dr. King that will form the backbone of our MLK Shabbat service, "We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope." This may be, once again, a time to refrain from embracing. But the time for embracing will surely come again.

Tu biShvat is coming. Right now, in Israel, the almond tree buds are bursting at their seams, flowers breaking forth. Right now, in New England, the different spongy maple parts clothed in winter bark are preparing to send the sugar up through the tree's veins. The cold will come again, without question. How much sweetness, with hope and prayer, can we make while the sun shines and then again when the energy falls low and dormant?

On my Tu biShvat table on the 16th, I'll put a little cup of maple syrup, to taste this truth. Our progression through pandemic isn't linear. Our walk toward justice leads us over some staggering heights and drops. But like the sap, still—in Batya Levine and Rabbi Noam Lerman's words—we rise.

# RABBINIC INTERN ELLI'S REFLECTIONS



Happy (Gregorian) New Year!

As we turn to the new year, we think about where we want to go, what we want to change, and who we want to be in the year ahead. Certainly, that's a theme of Rosh HaShanah, and it is also a theme now, as we consider the past year of our lives.

It can be difficult to look back. We have come from one peak of the pandemic last year to another now. Despite all we now know and how far we have come with vaccines, masking, and technology, the world is, again, folding in on itself.

If you are interested in learning more about Jewish traditions of personal growth and transformation as a part of your exploration this new year, I'd love to see you at my Introduction to Mussar class on January 10. 

# **MEMBER SPOTLIGHT**

#### Spotlight on Scott Hannula, Social Committee Chair



Scott Hannula joined Temple Emanu-El in 2012 with his wife Andi and their two sons, Adam and Zack; they live in Groveland. Scott chairs the Social Committee and serves as secretary on the temple's board of directors; he also chairs the Rabbinic Intern Search Committee and chaired our 2020 High Holy

Day Committee. Scott works as a consulting engineer at General Electric. All four Hannulas participate actively in the Boy Scouts and love family adventures—everything from hiking to investigating factories—taking copious artistic selfies, and honing pop-up-tent setup to a high pitch of perfection.

Scott grew up in Westminster, Massachusetts, right near Mount Wachusett, hiking and fishing and enjoying the outdoors with his mother, Clara, father, Vic (z"l), and brother, Bill. Vic got his kids into the habit of adventuring early and often—he'd stock the family camper with supplies for a trip, "back the camper out of the driveway and say, 'where do you want to go?' And we went!" Scott joined the marching band in high school, and says that "most of what I learned about football, I learned holding a sousaphone in the stands at games." Scott caught his dad's lifelong love of football and keeps up the tradition of Hannula-and-friends outings with Patriots season tickets; they adapted last year with pop-up tents in each other's driveways.

Scott earned his undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering at Worcester Polytechnic Institute. A six-month co-op stint with GE helped Scott decide to go straight into its

manufacturing management program upon graduation. Scott has enjoyed the diversity of work that's offered and the broad spectrum of knowledgeable people in his twenty-seven years at GE. He spent a great year in Louisville, Kentucky, came back up to Fitchburg, Massachusetts, and the steam-driven plant there, and then earned a master's degree in engineering management at Tufts. Scott especially enjoys people management and the opportunities to be a mentor at work.

Scott and Andi found Temple Emanu-El right across the bridge from them when they moved here from Schenectady, New York. They were attracted to its warm, homey feel and caring teachers. Scott especially enjoys Simchat Torah and Purim at Temple Emanu-El, where everyone lets their guard down a bit for some intergenerational, out-of-character dancing and fun. Scott has also invested deeply in Jewish education, doing "a bar mitzvah by pieces." He joined our first adult leyning class in 2018 and has leyned regularly since, including at our High Holy Day services and at both Adam's and Zack's bar mitzvah celebrations. Scott has delivered two divrei Torah so far, and he studies one daf (double-sided page) of Talmud each day on the worldwide Daf Yomi schedule, which takes a student through the entire Babylonian Talmud over the course of

seven years. (If you are interested, like Scott, in an every-other-week discussion of the daily daf with Temple members, email Cantor Vera!)

In social events, in services, in study, and in meetings and committee work, Scott shows up ready to get things done and to have fun doing them. He is a mensch in a family of mensches. Thank you Scott and Andi for making your family part of our Temple family!



The Social Committee brainstorms and implements fun occasions for members of our community to come together and socialize. Past events include Jewish Heritage Night at Fenway Park, an Israeli movie screening and lunch at the temple, and our annual summer barbecue at Camp Tel Noar, where members cook, play games, and enjoy the open space together. Scott says that "worship's important, study's important, but community and camaraderie are [also] a big deal. What we've done in the past has established relationships across generations." The committee hopes to create an event at a local bowling alley once conditions permit! It's always looking for new ideas (and members). 


















# Raising Jewish Children

Everyone helping to raise a Jewish child is welcome; you do not need to be a member to participate.





