

Dear chevre,



created together. We feel ourselves emerging-God willing-from the confines of COVID, as we take stock again of who we are and how we want to go about being in the world. As I often ask in the last moments before we sing L'cha Dodi together on a Friday night: What, from the time before, do we want to take with us through the door opening into this new moment? And what do we leave behind?

At a clergy meeting last month, a colleague of mine said ruefully, "Judaism is wired for continuity, not change." I hear where he's coming from. Our traditional rituals and behavior are built for endurance: Jewish separation from the world around us (in food, dress, rest time, language, law) is often presented as essential to Jewish survival, and the words of the Sh'ma exhort us to "teach these [commandments] to your children" (D'varim 6:6). Judaism values consistency and commitment. Jews read the same Torah every year, everyone everywhere all at once. We sing with whole hearts of keeping the flame of our faith burning I'dor vador, from generation to generation. Particular customs, dearly beloved, are passed down in families and in our community: a few examples are making latkes and baking hamantaschen as a community with our Chesed and Religious School Committees, reading the translation of each parashah aloud in our services, collecting food and clothing for Emmaus, and accumulating b'nei mitzvah kippot on the bust in the back of our sanctuary. When at age twenty-three I walked into a synagogue in Tbilisi, capital of the Caucasus Republic of Georgia, I took great comfort in the familiarity of Jewish ritual even when the music and setting were so different. Doing what our Jewish ancestors, physical and/or spiritual, have done before us is both an obligation and a privilege.

And yet, I believe that we are also wired for change. Jews are a people who have passed through the narrows of restrictions and prejudice and remade ourselves on the other side, in new and freely chosen identity. That took so much getting used to that we have a whole ritual for letting the spiritual dust of the freedom journey settle (counting the Omer till Shavuot lands!). But we

made it, and we make it. Judaism celebrates creativity and innovation! The Judaism we practice now owes just as much if not more to on-one-foot rabbinic meaning-making and adaptation, amid the rubble of the Second Temple, as to the Five Books of Moshe. Personal Jewish innovative logic, svara, informed by but not bound by precedent, is so important that the Talmud upholds some halakhic rulings based on it even when they contradict other rulings based on precedent. There is now an entire modern yeshiva, school, of queer Talmud study named "Svara: A Traditionally Radical Yeshiva." Svara operates within the context of tradition, not outside of it. And when new conditions make repeating exactly what beloved custom came before impossible, svara gives our tradition room to breathe and grow.

So where has our svara led us, as a Temple Emanu-El community, these past few years? It's led us to adapt how we pray and learn and feed one another's bodies and souls. It's led us to the great outdoors, to opening every window in our shul that can open, to dropped-off meals and packages and cards. It's led us into the wilds of Zoom and composite videos. It's led us to put masks on when we need to and take them off when we can. It's led us to welcome the creativity and energy of rabbinic interns and a rabbi-educator and new staffing configurations for our temple. It's led us to start thinking more seriously about antiracism work and a Jewish spiritual lens on climate change. It's led us to collaborate consistently and successfully with other communities, to make the format and schedule of committee meetings and classes more accessible to a wider range of people and living situations.

And, exercising our communal svara has helped us to identify those parts of our tradition that we hold most dear, which guard us as we guard them: coming together for Friday nights and Saturday mornings. Studying our parashiyot. Talking about Israel regularly, at Israel Chavurah. Singing together, through thick and thin, air and Wi-Fi. Giving our Temple youth a Jewish education grounded in our community's values and practices. Providing learning and enrichment for our adult community. Helping our elders thrive and know that you are valued. Reaching out to our interfaith community for mutual support and education. Looking for what brokenness in the world is ours to fix and applying our considerable energies and resources to those tasks. These are the things that we continue to do, here at Temple Emanu-El.

So, as we open up our doors and windows to this summer and all that lies beyond it, what do you want to continue? Hold fast to it. And what new opportunities might your, and our, svara create? Let them bloom.

Spotlight on Nancy LaFleur, Retiring Executive Director

Nancy J. LaFleur is our Temple's outgoing executive director. She has worked at Temple Emanu-El since 1998. Nancy and her husband, Mike, live in Hampstead, New Hampshire, where Nancy was born and raised in six houses up and down Main Street. Nancy and Mike have two sons: Russell lives with his wife, Elizabeth, and daughter, Livia, in Raleigh North Carolina; and Craig lives in Manchester, New Hampshire. Nancy loves to swim, to read, to travel, to volunteer, and to see her children

and granddaughter. She is looking forward to pursuing all of these activities in her richly deserved retirement, even though it will feel strange to no longer be in charge here!

Nancy says of her time here at Temple Emanu-El, "Connectionthere was always connection! It was almost like it was meant to be." Nancy's parents, Eleanor and Clarence, grew up in Haverhill. Eleanor kept a thorough scrapbook of her Haverhill High School days, which Nancy has generously shared with Temple members over the years. Eleanor's first job was at Hudson Fur with the Fishbein family: she became a trailblazing real estate agent and a committed board member of many institutions. Clarence was a WWII Navy veteran, town plumber for Hampstead (where the couple moved in 1948), and professional house flipper. Eleanor

brought groups of residents of the Rockingham County Nursing Home to the family's lakeside home for lunch, where Nancy and her three sisters and brother served and made conversation. After high school, Nancy worked up to software department manager for Compugraphic before deciding to stay home while her kids were little. Back in the workforce, she saw a little ad for a job at Temple Emanu-El. She was hired, after a brief hiccup, as an office worker by the quartet of Joan Nagler, Janet Kopel z"l, Larry Cowan, and Rabbi Korinow. On Joan's retirement, Nancy became Temple administrator and later, executive director.

Just like Eleanor, Nancy loves to be a friendly presence, to talk to people, and to find out how they're doing. Nancy credits her own professional success to her parents' work ethic and particularly to her mother's drive for business and steady encouragement to ask questions. "No question is a dumb question! I never hesitated to ask or to say 'why can't we do it this way?" Barbara Berg and Janet Kopel worked with Nancy when she started; with Rabbi Korinow, they taught Nancy "Judaism 101" as she got oriented to Jewish temple life and vocabulary. Nancy says, "It's been a wonderful experience learning the Jewish faith and the circle of life. You're always

learning here on the job, and that's something I've always loved.... You're the ears and the eyes of the temple. You're the gatherer of all the good news—the sad news too, unfortunately—and you learn how to disseminate that information."

Nancy will dearly miss "the people I work with and all the members of the temple who I've come in contact with. I've

loved listening to their rich history; I have loved getting to know their extended families." She remembers Janet Kopel with great love. Nancy was starstruck when member and cooking maven Ethel Goralnick, whose recipes Nancy had been making from the Lawrence Eagle Tribune for years, had her over for a cooking lesson. (Nancy's favorites: veal marsala and biscotti.) They became fast friends. Nancy speaks with pride of the massive software update just two years into her time at Temple Emanu-El, of the fabulous 70th anniversary gala, and of settling in our school tenants (first Bradford Christian Academy and Haverhill Public Schools). She is proud that Temple leadership valued her input and her talent for respectful innovation by asking her to sit on the Temple Board of Directors and Executive Committee. Most of all, Nancy appreciates how our temple "made me part of the

family." The outpouring of love from members when her own parents died (Eleanor in 2004, Clarence in 2016) still overwhelms her.

As Nancy prepares to leave, she hopes that our beloved community continues to thrive, that the coming generation "knows the importance of being part of a Jewish community and how wonderful and warm this temple is, with no airs." Nancy deeply appreciates our Temple staff. "It's a wonderful working staff; we all want to make sure we're on the same page and that we succeed." We are all delighted that Lisa Anthony has joined our staff as executive administrator and Nancy's successor, and it's been a joy to see Nancy and Lisa working together to train Lisa for a smooth and effective transition. We know our temple continues to be in good hands.

Eleanor used to say, "When one door shuts, another one will open." It is a wrench to let the door close on your time with us, Nancy. But you will always be part of our Temple Emanu-El family, and we look to both your future and ours with glad and eager hearts. Todah rabbah. Thank you for your time with us: all you have willingly learned, and all you have beautifully taught. We love you and we'll miss you.

Spotlight on Loren Goldstein, Immediate Past President

Loren Hiller Goldstein ("Hiller" is for his great-great-grand-father Hillel) has been a member of Temple Emanu-El for twenty-eight years. He and his wife, Michelle, live in Bradford, Massachusetts; their son, Cory, grew up in Temple Emanu-El, once told a Newport rabbi that his favorite food was cheeseburgers, and now works for the New England Patriots. Loren loves seeing live music with Michelle; they've seen the band Chicago every year since 1983 and used to go out

dancing to local cover band Don't Call Me Shirley. Loren has held season tickets to the Red Sox since 1998 and enjoys being part of the crowds at live sporting events. And he's an avid reader of current events and history—next up is a biography on Judah Benjamin, the first Jewish man to be nominated to the Supreme Court of the United States.

Loren grew up in Stoneham, with his brother, Maurice, in the home where his mother, Paula, still lives. His grandparents were members of Temple Tifereth Israel in

New Bedford. Loren's father, Arnold (z"I), served Temple Judea of Stoneham as its president for more than twenty-five years, until its merger with Temple Shir Tikvah (now of Winchester), and he and Paula ran temple bingo games. Loren learned the value of Jewish community from his family's years of service. The Zaitchik Brothers were members of the Temple Judea chorus, giving Loren an early and enduring appreciation for good Jewish music. Their rendition of the Max Janowski "Sim Shalom" blew Loren away, and he and Michelle asked Cantor Jeff Stock to sing it at Cory's bar mitzvah celebration here.

Loren majored at business at Salem State University. In his freshman year, Maurice asked Loren to chaperone a Temple B'nai Abraham (Beverly) high school trip to see the Harlem Globetrotters at Boston Garden and offered to introduce Loren to Maurice's girlfriend's sister. At the end of the evening, on the steps of the Wonderland T station, Loren asked Michelle out, "and the rest is history." They married in 1989.

Loren worked as a baker in the Star Market bakery department for most of college, until, in search of practical experience for his business degree, he got a job at Gauthier Motors and entered the world of car sales, leasing, and financing. Loren has enjoyed a thirty-five-year career working for Mercedes-Benz. Twenty-six of those years have been at Smith Motors, where he now wears multiple hats and is glad to work five days a week instead of six!


Loren and Michelle joined Temple Emanu-El in search of clergy consistency and an engaging place for Cory. They appreciated Rabbi Korinow's already impressive tenure here, they loved the TAPT program, and Cantor Stock was a great teacher. Loren jumped in as a leader and served as president from 2010 to 2012. He returned to the post in 2018, serving this time around for an extended term of four years, seeing us through the pandemic and readying Jennifer Lampron to take over the presidency. Loren is most

proud of having helped the temple gain 501(c)3 status, transitioning religious school to one day a week to ease the logistical burden on families, and helping to "make the cantor our spiritual leader, which has changed our community quite a bit!" He is also proud of Haverhill Public Schools' tenancy here. Loren says, with wonder in his voice, "That big building our forefathers laid down has become a blessing not just to us, but to the community at large." Loren's most emotional moments at Temple Emanu-El are when he blows the shofar as our ba'al tokeia on the High Holy Days. Every time, he says a private prayer for his mother's mother, Yetta Blau z"l, who never met "the love of my life" Michelle nor heard him take up the shofar his parents brought back from Israel more than forty years ago.


Thank you, Loren, for your devotion to our Temple Emanu-El community. We've been blessed by your leadership and wish you rest and refreshment of spirit!

PRIDE SHABBAT






