Dear chaveirim, dear friends,

As March begins, we celebrate the festival of Purim. On Purim we let it all hang out: we mock, we parody, we are raucous, we drown out the name of the enemy Haman, we dress up. Shelly Gladstein is spearheading our Purim costume contest this year—the theme is "A Star is Born," and categories are Beauty Queen, Reality Show/Social Media Star and Family, Hollywood Star, Rock 'n' Roll Star and Group, TV Star and Family, and Astrological Star. We

hope to see you there, all decked out; anyone attending who's not in costume and is willing to judge gets to choose the winners!

On the other side of the coin, Purim encourages us to look for and appreciate what may be hidden from our sight. Queen Esther's name may be etymologically linked to the Babylonian goddess Ishtar, but the Hebrew translation of the shoresh or root or is "hidden." Esther hides something important about herself from King Achashveirosh's court: her Jewish identity, which ultimately becomes her greatest strength.

The pen name of an important Yiddish writer of the Soviet era, Der Nister, shares Esther's shoresh. Born Pinkhes Kahanovitsh in Berdichev, Ukraine, Der Nister spent time as an undocumented resident in Russia (outside of the Pale of Settlement, to which Jews were restricted) to immerse himself in the work of Yiddish literature, lived for five years in Berlin, and then returned to live and write in Kharkov. He was part of the Jewish settlement of

Birobidzhan, arrested with many others in roundups of Yiddish cultural figures, and died in Soviet prison in 1950. His most famous work was a historical novel called *Di mishpokhe Mashber*, *The Mashber Family*. The writer Dara Horn imagines Der Nister speaking to a young Jewish orphan named Boris in her novel *The World to Come*:

"What is your real name, Comrade Kulbak?" Boris looked at him, confused. "Boris," he tried.

"No," the man said. "I mean your real name, your Jewish name."

Boris thought a moment, frightened. Had he forgotten his own name? He stood in silence, almost for too long. "Benjamin," he finally said. No one had called him that in over a year.

"Benjamin," Der Nister said. "What's your full name? Benjamin son of who?"

Boris thought again, even more frightened. What if he couldn't

remember? His mother had once told him that only with his full name would he be admitted to the world to come. What was it? "Benjamin son of Jacob," he blurted, relieved.

Der Nister smiled. "Benjamin and Jacob. Nafsho keshura benafsho. You know what that means?"

Boris shuddered and shook his head. He was used to speaking Yiddish with his teachers, even though the boys usually spoke Russian among themselves. But Hebrew he had long forgotten.

"It's from Genesis, about Jacob and his son Benjamin," Der Nister explained. "Nafsho keshura benafsho—'His soul was bound to his.' That's how it is with a father and son. What happens to him, happens to you."

It is easy to lose touch with parts of our identities that we keep hidden, but they have something important to teach us. We may hide them because they're painful to think about—if they're connected with a loss, or discrimination, or shame. But they can help root us in who we are, remind us of our personal histories and truths, and give us strength to act. When we reveal them, we connect deeply to one another.

There is a beautiful teaching in Talmud Ta'anit as Rabbi Yitzchak and Rabbi Yishma'eil consider the connection of blessing to what's hidden and what's revealed, and discuss God's blessings on stored food in barns that has not yet been measured or assessed: "A blessing is found only in that which is hidden from the eye." Now, on the face of it, we have plenty of things that we bless specifically upon seeing them: a rainbow, a flowering tree, other people, the arrival of a holiday. We see and feel and smell and hear and taste God's blessings in the world around us every day.

I think what this piece of Talmud teaches us is that what's hidden has a special quality of grace precisely because we have not yet measured and assessed it. We cannot take it for granted. There's mystery, and a sense of gift. Think about the last time you unwrapped a present: the inner excitement and anticipation, the curiosity and appreciation, that comes from not-yet-knowing. There is enormous potential in what's concealed. Revelation makes real and changes that potential into action; without the mystery, we might not cultivate that appetite to act.

When we conceal something important about ourselves—from others or from ourselves—we have an opportunity for this kind of blessing of potential, of anticipatory gratitude. We have the power to reveal what may make us or our communities stronger. We feel and cultivate holy curiosity about one another and what untapped gifts we may harbor within ourselves.

Megillat Esther is the one book of Tanakh where God is never mentioned directly. Jews read it and search for God in the text and narrative. Many rabbis understand Mordecai's famous words in chapter 4, "Help will come to us 'from another place," to allude to God. But it's just that—allusion. We have to go

looking for the core of miracle within this story, and within ourselves.

This month, I hope you'll create an opportunity to share something important about yourself, a strength or a gift, with someone else in our community who might not have known it. Let yourself feel that holy curiosity and find blessing in what wasn't seen before. Appreciate what's hidden, and what's revealed, and may both build our whole community's strength.



GREATEST GENERATION SPOTLIGHT

Spotlight on Betsy Webb

Betsy Webb joined Temple Emanu-El in 2020. She and her husband, Kincade (also a member), live on Plum Island. Betsy's children are Ben (Lisa), Jonno (Susan), and Jenny (Alison); her six grandchildren are Emma, Samuel, Maggie, Lily, Levi, and

Ada. She and Kincade also proudly count as family their chosen children, Kate (Ben), Jacob (Sophia), Lucas, and Nicky. Betsy's a lifelong educator, learner, singer, and instrumentalist.

Betsy was born in Boston and grew up in a big house on Chestnut Hill overlooking the reservoir. Her parents, Myron "Mike" K. Stone and Natalie Gordon Stone, raised Betsy and her younger siblings, Pamela and Randall, with constant admonitions to be among and to become "the right people," but Betsy was never quite sure who those were. Cotillion dances, even the Longwood Assemblies her mother organized for the Jewish kids left out of the Beacon Assemblies, were not Betsy's style.

Religious school at Temple Sinai in Brookline was a safe and special place for Betsy. In kindergarten, she learned an English version of the last verse of Adon Olam to say before the bedtime Sh'ma-a practice she continues to this day-and eager to have Shabbat dinners, she brought home a Sabbath plate, which her mother dismissed as "frum." Shabbat dinners lived at her mother's parents' home, where Grandpa Gordon would put his hat on after the meal, go into the living room, and talk in his Russian accent to a portrait of his father. Betsy's family went skiing in North Conway during winter break, always staying at the Clarendon Inn—open to Jewish families when many were not—to support innkeeper Harry Noel. In a different shul's religious high school program, a teacher told Betsy that since Natalie, trained in the Wellesley College choir, sang Christmas songs around the house, Natalie wasn't Jewish. Betsy walked out and did not return. "Music isn't prejudiced," she says. At boarding school, she enjoyed attending both Quaker meeting and Jewish High Holy Day services.

Betsy grew up in a home filled with song. Mike started taking her to the symphony with his parents when she was eight years old and Betsy fell in love with it. She began playing flute at age ten; at seventy, in the Wakefield Lakeside Concert Band,

> she switched to oboe, which she now plays in the Merrimack Valley Concert Band. Betsy sang with the Spectrum Singers during her years in Cambridge, with Shir-El at Congregation Beth El of Sudbury with Cantor Lorel Zar-Kessler, and now in our Temple Emanu-El Makheila.

> Betsy attended Radcliffe College for two years and then earned her undergraduate degree in education from Barnard College. She enjoyed being part of Barnard's Higher Horizons program during her college years, teaching kids in Morningside Heights, and still uses a signed cookbook her students gave her when the program concluded. She taught literacy and then art in newly integrated schools in New


Jersey for three years before moving back to Lexington, Massachusetts. Betsy sent her eldest son, Ben, to Waldorf school for first grade, and within a couple of years she was teaching there, too: first gym, then music, finally history. Betsy appreciates the Waldorf approach—its emphasis on stories, plentiful music, keeping kids with their teachers for more than one year, and attune-ment to kids' educational needs at different ages. All three of her kids went to Waldorf. Meanwhile, the spare rooms in Betsy and Kincade's house in Cambridge were always full of their kids' friends, some of them long-term, with whom they often forged lasting relationships.

Here at Temple Emanu-El, Betsy is enjoying the in-person activities that are helping her to meet more members since the worst of COVID has subsided: she loves choir, Spirited Aging Together, and especially appreciates our ecumenical presentation of the Martin Luther King Jr. Shabbat service. "It's easy to think the whole problem [of racism and winning civil rights] is solved, and it isn't." Betsy and Kincade, we're glad that we're "the right people" for you; you certainly are for us!
