Dear chevre,

A plaintive number opens Stephen Sondheim's *A Little Night Music*, which I saw last month at Haverhill City Hall in a production by the Pentucket Players. "Remember?" a series of shifting couples sing to one another, about the details of their romantic liaisons. The question, despite its light and amorous context, has echoed.

May, as flowers bloom new around us, is also rooted in Jewish acts of remembrance. Remembering the journey through the wilderness, day by day of the Omer, step by sandy step. Remembering the dead of the Sho'ah, who this weekend we mourn and in whose memories we make impassioned vows. Remembering the crimes of the Nazis, without justifying or redeeming. Each week, remembering Shabbat and keeping it.

What do we mean when we say, "May their memory be for a blessing?" What do we mean when we say, "Never again?" Never a repeat? Never a likeness?

Why do we have *remember* and *guard* in the same breath for the Asseret HaDib'rot?

Memory is activism and memory is necessary to justice.

Judaism encourages us to remember, to acknowledge and cite our sources, to speak and sing "b'sheim omro," in the name of the one who said it first. In the Talmud, it's common to read chains of transmission equal to or longer than the rabbinic opinion cited. "Rabbi Shim'on ben Elazar said, in the name of Chilfa bar Agra, who spoke in the name of Rabbi Yochanan ben Nuri ..." (Shabbat 105:b). At our Pesach community seder, Social Action Committee chair Lisa Herzl led us in an acknowledgment of the creativity of enslaved Black people in America, fighting to be free, who wrote so many of our seder songs, "Go Down Moses" among them. In acknowledgment of the unsung, uncompensated composers whose names we don't know, and the work of so many Black artists that has been unacknowledged and uncompensated, I made a donation in our temple's name to Action Centered Tutoring Services in Springfield, Massachusetts, which provides one-to-one tutoring and mentoring to elementary school students. We start small, and our memory, God willing, returns to and amplifies these necessary acknowledgments.

Memory is activism and memory is necessary to justice. Last weekend, our community learned from Dr. Rachel Lehr and Dr. Ruth Mandel about the creation and installation ceremonies for stolpersteine, "stumbling stones" set flush in the sidewalks outside European homes from which Jews and other Sho'ah victims were taken. The artist Gunther Demnig creates these



stolpersteine, an enormous decentralized art installation. On their brass faces, the names and dates and details of individuals are engraved, one for each unique person, grouped by family outside of a home. Communities gather for these ceremonies, to bear witness. Individuals speak of developing relationships with the stolpersteine, coming back to care for them and clean them at regular intervals, schoolchildren taking rubbings of them as part of their curricula. We learned also of opposition to the installation of the stolpersteine: municipalities where it is illegal to put them on public property. governments who do not support their installation. They are conspicuously rare in Poland and Hungary, they are sown liberally in Germany, and in Norway the national government has funded the creation and installation of over seven hundred stolpersteine to remember Norwegian Jews killed in the Sho'ah. During our program, a Temple member asked whether Armenians have taken up the art form of stolpersteine to commemorate the genocide they experienced in the land that is now the Republic of Turkey. Dr. Mandel pointed out that Turkey does not acknowledge the Armenian genocide, and that without such acknowledgment, no publicly installed commemoration is possible. During that genocide, it was a crime to take photos of murdered Armenians, or concentration camps of Armenians, so that the world might not learn of or remember their suffering.

To remember carries an obligation to act. To guard what, and who, is vulnerable. To tell the truth. To fight for justice. To live as a blessing.

In this month of spring and movement, let our rooted memories, awoken, flower like this.

RABBINIC INTERN ELLI'S REFLECTIONS



As we move out of Pesach and toward Shavuot, we have a unique practice. We count each day, fulfilling the mitzvah of counting the Omer.

Counting the Omer is a strange tradition in some ways. It's a simple commandment, to count the seven weeks of seven days

between Passover and Shavuot, to remind ourselves, each day, that one day has passed or ten days or thirty days. Counting the Omer is a practice of waiting.

I must admit that I myself am not always the most patient person, and waiting is difficult for me. I also have found, somehow, that the Omer consistently ends up marking important times and phases in my life. In 2019, I counted the Omer as I spent my last days in Minnesota, preparing to move to Boston. Last year, as I counted the Omer, I was in Seattle, spending time with my mother, taking her to dialysis, and later in Boston moving out of the communal home I'd lived in for the past two years.

I try to practice patience as I count. Shavuot is my favorite Jewish holiday, and it often lands near my birthday. I love Shavuot's focus on learning and connecting with God—and of course, eating cheese and ice cream.

But the practice of this waiting and counting reminds us that we cannot hurry our way to revelation or past what is hard. We need to wait, in the desert. We need to know that we can handle the passing of time, as we heal and change and grow.

As I count the Omer this year, I am so grateful to have spent time with all of you and to have been part of Temple Emanu-El. Thank you for inviting me into your community, learning with me, and growing with me.

Baruch atah Adonai, eloheinu melech ha'olam, asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al sefirat ha Omer.

Blessed are you, Adonai our God, ruler of the Universe, who sanctified us with your mitzvot and commanded us to count the Omer.

Spotlight on Kevin Miller, Dues Committee Chair

Kevin Miller chairs the Dues Committee and has been a member since 1987. He is a past president of Temple Emanu-El (2008–2010), the B'nai Brith Lodge, and the Temple Brotherhood. He is also a past chair of the Ritual Committee (now the Religious Practices Committee). Kevin has enjoyed two concurrent careers of more than thirty years, as an

underwriter for the Lexington Insurance Company and as an accounting and business teacher at Southern New Hampshire University. Kevin and his wife, Eunice, live in Salem, New Hampshire, where they run their chocolate business, KRM Chocolates. Their two sons are Arthur (wife Katy, kids Lucy and Jane) and Sam.

Kevin grew up in Revere with his parents, Jonah and Helen, and two elder sisters, Daryll and Bonnie. His family attended Congregation Tifereth Israel, the Litvish Schul. Like many of the shul's founding members, Helen's family had come from Lithuania to Boston (traveling eastward—the long way round!) in the middle of World War I. Kevin developed a zest for Jewish

community leadership from a young age. His high school passion was B'nai Brith Youth Organization (BBYO), and he yearned to become the Grand Aleph Gadol (the international president of AZA, the men's branch of BBYO). He served as a regional officer and was a candidate for international vice president. Kevin loved getting Jewish kids from the surrounding towns together for events and hanging out on their particular spot on the Revere beach afterward.


Kevin found his calling in actuarial science (applied statistics) two years into a pre-med program at Clark University. He transferred to Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa, taking his first-ever plane flight. A tornado warning was issued on his very first day at Drake, and Kevin found himself in the basement thinking, "What the hell did I get myself into?!" Kevin learned to appreciate Iowa's wide-open spaces—"Nothing but cornfields and perfectly straight roads cutting through"—and

how different distances felt in a place where folks thought nothing of driving fifty miles to see a movie. After college, a friend from BBYO introduced him to her cousin Eunice at a Jewish singles' dance at the Sydney Hill Country Club in Newton. They hit it off right away, and the rest is history.

Kevin loves all of his jobs. He loves the creativity of writing individualized insurance policies. He also appreciates how he can become "a completely different person" teaching in a classroom setting: joking, making small talk, taking center stage, and going the extra mile to make his courses fun for his students. Kevin first learned to make chocolates on an emergency footing, to help his sister-in-law Debbie. After suffering a stroke in December 2011, Kevin turned first to walking and household chores during his rehabilitation and then, at Eunice's urging, to crafting chocolate. Now KRM participates in regular farmers' market and holiday fair circuits! Kevin's favorite chocolate to make is peanut butter. He also

enjoys making a high-antioxidant dark chocolate with six different berries.

Kevin and Eunice came to Temple Emanu-El when their son Arthur enrolled at the Solomon Schechter Day School, and they wanted to daven (pray) closer to their home. Kevin's favorite Temple Emanu-El memory is from 2005: Kevin was named Volunteer of the Year, Eunice won the Jerome Rosengard Memorial Award, and Sam won the HEFTY Student of the Year award. During his time as Temple president, Kevin took pride in attending every shul event, innovating (for example, the Yom Kippur break-fast and a Jewish Pride Night for baseball in Manchester, New Hampshire), and lifting up member ideas and contributions. "If people are appreciated, they'll come back for more." Todah rabbah, Kevin, for your many acts of leadership and service. You have made our community life sweeter, and we appreciate you!

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.
