One step back, two steps forward

Dear chevre.

Over my desk at home hangs a framed piece of art from Kolbo in Brookline. My Mekorot class (first year cantorial and rabbinical students at seminary) gave it to me at the end of our year of study together, as a wedding present. It looks like a multicolored egg cracking open, with the word "tikkun" (repair) on the top half and "olam" (the

world/eternity) on the bottom. In between are the famous words of Rabbi Tarfon from Pirkei Avot 2:21: "Lo alecha ham'lacha ligmor, v'lo atah bein chorin l'hibateil mimenah." It's not on you to complete the work, and you're not free to nullify its importance.

Like the ketubah Mike and I signed later that spring, Rabbi Tarfon's words, presented by my friends and colleagues-to-be, affirm that there will inevitably be bumps in the road. But a path based on my own deepest values, which I love and have dedicated myself to, is worth my energy and effort even if its work seems never-ending. These documents bring me back to those values in times of stress or difficulty.

Throughout the past month, as the Delta variant of coronavirus has steadily increased Massachusetts' caseload, the heady excitement of early summer's newly vaccinated freedom has dissipated. A rueful, stolid endurance has taken its place as our nation confronts the disappointing truth: we thought we were done with coronavirus, but we're not there yet. It's interesting to place this feeling in the context of Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, holidays on which we celebrate fresh starts, reinvigoration.

Let's lean into our High Holy Day season, not with an expectation that all the world's ills will be immediately wiped away, or with anger that they're not, but with gratitude for the ways our Jewish practices support us spiritually and encourage us to find new paths to growth.

How do we keep up our hopeful energy when it feels as if recent gains are being erased? That's become this fall's theme. Masks are back on, distancing and keeping ourselves out of crowds is once again necessary. Including for people who are vaccinated, a little bit of vinegar in the wound. America is also dealing with a goal reached and then melting away in another international arena. A fragile ceasefire trembles each day in Kabul as international planes airlift out international citizens and vulnerable Afghan supporters and their families. What the Taliban will do once the evacuations are over remains an open question. Newspapers are full of service members and politicians and bereaved families alike asking, "Were the last twenty years of American involvement worth what our country spent and sacrificed, if it was going to end like this?"

# **CANTOR VERA'S MESSAGE**

Don Goodrich and his late wife, Sally, founded the Mohammad Agha District school in Afghanistan, in memory of their son, Peter, who died on the second plane to strike the Twin Towers on 9/11. Goodrich spoke to Boston Globe correspondent Charles Sennot on August 21. "The question I guess is was it worth it, what we did to build a school. Did it help? And for all of us who grieve the failures of what we did in Afghanistan and who are troubled by them, we have to ask: What was the alternative? To do nothing?" He pointed out that as a result of the American presence in Afghanistan, millions of girls across the country have been educated and institutions of democracy and courts with due process have been built. He added, "To have done something is better than to have done nothing." Every Afghan quote in every story I read speaks with palpable pride and determination of the past twenty years of Afghan-led education and economic development, some Afghans even calling openly on the Taliban to change and adapt to Afghanistan as it has become, a place where women study and teach and work openly alongside men. A whole generation now in their university years has grown up without the Taliban's rule. The positive experiences and learning that have been done may be denied expression, but cannot be undone.

We can remember the steps forward that preceded painful, difficult steps back. Human research developed a highly effective vaccine for coronavirus in under a year, and a lot of people—not nearly enough, not yet, but 2.5 billion people, a quarter of the world's population—are now fully vaccinated and are therefore overwhelmingly unlikely to suffer hospitalization or death if they do still contract coronavirus. This is a medical miracle, and every life saved, so says our Talmud, is a world saved.

Supporting human rights in countries that aren't our own is a difficult and never-ending endeavor, regardless of end dates of particular initiatives. (Supporting human rights in our own country is also a difficult and never-ending endeavor.) Bringing our world out of the shadow of a global pandemic is a long slog. Let's pace ourselves emotionally. Let's lean into our High Holy Day season, not with an expectation that all the world's ills will be immediately wiped away, or with anger that they're not, but with gratitude for the ways our Jewish practices support us spiritually and encourage us to find new paths to growth. And let's repeat to ourselves: it is not on us to complete these works. But we need to stick with them.


What outgrowth of your own deepest values, despite wear and tear, will you re-commit to this year?

Dear community,

We write with excitement to share our plans for the upcoming High Holy Days as we begin 5782 together! We look forward to celebrating wonderful services—uplifting, stirring, and musical—with lots

of communal participation and leadership. In order to help preserve life and also to create the most cohesive, communal experience possible, our board of directors has made the decision that our main services will all take place on Zoom, with only the service leaders and honorees inside the building. Once again, we will sharply miss being together in the building, but given Delta's transmissibility, we believe this is the right decision for our community. Some of you may be relieved to hear this news; some of you may be disappointed; we know that each of you hold your own hopes and expectations for these High Holy Days, and our hope is to make them as warm and connected as possible. We expect that some of you will feel safe and good gathering with your families or with each other in your homes, and hope that if so, this will also enhance this year's experience for you.

You can see the full schedule of our High Holy Day services elsewhere in this bulletin. Members and those nonmembers who are generously donating \$180 or more can pick up your machzor, High Holy Day supplement, Yizkor book, stone for Yizkor, and photo of the Temple sanctuary from the Temple office at the following days and times:

Monday, August 30–Thursday, September 2 11:00 am–3:00 pm or 5:00–7:00 pm

If you are not able to come to the temple at any of these times, please let <u>Nancy LaFleur</u> know. After the High Holy Days, you will receive an email with instructions on returning your machzorim.

#### What will be similar to last year?

You can register to attend services through Zoom at this link. Services will also be streamed live, as we did last year, to our Temple Emanu-El YouTube channel. Lisa Desberg will lead a wake-up yoga flow on the first morning of Rosh HaShanah over Zoom; you can register for that <a href="here">here</a>. The Hannula family will lead two <a href="Tashlich hikes">Tashlich hikes</a> at Winnekenni Pond on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh HaShanah, which will be followed by a Tashlich service. And our shaliach tzibbur, Phil Platcow, will once again lead a discussion in place of Mussaf on the second day of Rosh HaShanah.

#### What will be new this year?

We are delighted to offer this year in-person, outdoors-only Family Services on the first morning of Rosh HaShanah and on Yom Kippur, led by Cantor Vera and Rabbinic Intern Elli Pripas, outside the Temple building in our modified not-yet-sukkah. You can register for Family Services at this link. (In the event of inclement weather, Family Services will take place over Zoom. Please also register for the Zoom link here.) Our entire community is invited to join the Religious School for a community apple picking on the morning of Sunday, September 12, 10:00 am, at Barker Family Farms in North Andover. And for Yom Kippur Minchah, Rabbinic Intern Elli will lead a musical, contemplative alternative Minchah service as counterpoint to the afternoon's Torah and Haftarah readings! ## **MEMBER SPOTLIGHT**

#### Spotlight on Lisa Joy Desberg, PTO Chair

Lisa Desberg joined Temple Emanu-El in 2008 and lives in Haverhill with her daughter, Angelina, and partner, Eric. A high school English teacher in the Wilmington school district, she is also a Reiki master and teacher and a yogini—she looks

forward to leading wake-up yoga on the first morning of Rosh HaShanah for our congregation and to hearing Angie chant that morning's Haftarah! Lisa is also a writer; every November, she participates in National Novel Writing Month and writes a fifty-thousand word novel.

Lisa grew up in Sharon, Massachusetts, where "almost everyone I knew was Jewish," and was an active member of Temple Sinai. A six-week trip to Israel through NFTY with her best girlfriend, sampling kibbutz life and hiking in the Negev, was "wild ... perfection." She returned to Israel for her younger brother's bar mitzvah atop Masada, flanked by both of her grandfathers. Her mother's father, Henry Goldsmith (z"I), was a Sho'ah survivor from Offenbach. He daringly evaded Nazi

capture and eventually became a professor at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York; Lisa carries one of his handbags every Rosh HaShanah. Lisa shares his pride in being American, free and Jewish, which is important to her and Angie for its own sake—"you are enough because you are."

Lisa's love of teaching, which has been "in my heart from a young age," took wings after she graduated from Boston

University. She spent a year teaching at Hebei Vocational Technical College in Qinhuangdao, China, near Beijing. Living in a pair of rooms on campus, Lisa taught English classes and a packed weekly standing-room-only lecture on American

culture. After she came home in the wake of 9/11, Lisa began working in the Wilmington school district and has taught there ever since, earning her master's degree from UMass along the way. Lisa appreciates helping her students find the life lessons that emerge in their English classes, the impact that "strong, caring adults can make in a teen's life," and the impacts that the teens can have right back.

When Lisa and Angie came to Temple Emanu-El, TAPT and Debbi Levasseur's warm welcome helped them feel right at home in "a heart-centered place." Lisa treasures the friendships she's made with other religious school parents. Her favorite Temple memories are Angie's bat mitzvah in November 2019 and a challah cooking class with Gail Korinow (z"l). Gail "opened

her home to us and gave us something we could do in *our* homes." Lisa regularly bakes and shares Gail's challah. She loved hosting Havdalah Under the Stars at her home a couple of years ago, with people from both Temple Emanu-El and other parts of her life in her front yard holding hands and singing. And she enjoys listening to our temple's High Holy Day sermons!



The PTO's mission is to cheer on our wonderful Temple Emanu-El Religious School teachers—in Lisa's words, to "celebrate and appreciate their creativity, innovation, hard work and love; we're in awe of them!" The PTO runs at least one big event per year along with additional fun and fundraising events for parents, teachers, and students alike. Past events have included paint nights, auctions, silent auctions, ice cream socials, kugel bake-offs, and more. Last year the PTO also created delightful holiday packages for our religious school students and partnered with the Religious School Committee to create a beautiful afternoon of appreciation for outgoing Religious School principal Debra Levasseur. The PTO also regularly organizes holiday and end-of-year appreciations for the teaching staff. Lisa says that "being a part of the PTO means putting in a little bit of time for a lot extra that we can do for the teachers and students." 



#### Honor Your Father and Your Mother

It is a widely observed Jewish tradition to commemorate the passing of a loved one by memorializing those that have departed with a yahrzeit plaque on a dedicated memorial wall.

At Temple Emanu-El, these plaques are lit on the yahrzeit, or anniversary of death, and for Yizkor services.

Plaques are inscribed with the name of the deceased in both English and Hebrew as well as the date of the person's death. They are available to view whenever the sanctuary is open.

The one-time cost of the plaque is \$300. To purchase a plaque in honor of a departed loved one, contact Nancy or Cantor Vera at 978.373.3861.



# **Avoid Email Scams (Phishing)**

Communications from Temple Emanu-El will always come from an @TempleEmanu-El.org email address. Most—bulletins, Shavuons, bereavement notices, religious school messages—will come through Constant Contact, though some may come directly from individuals at the temple such as Cantor Vera, Rabbi Rachel, or Nancy.

# **Examine all emails carefully:**



- Check for odd sender email addresses.
- Are there spelling and grammar errors?
- Are they asking you to take an unusual action?
- Are there unexpected links or attachments?

# If you are unsure about an email:

- Don't click on any links.
- Don't open attachments.
- Don't reply to the sender.

- Block the sender, or mark the email as junk.
- Delete the email from your computer.
